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New Year Starts Positive

The New Year started with the District achieving its 11th straight month of a plus in membership, thanks to all club leaders that kept retention and recruitment high. Seven clubs have achieved a minimum of net 2 or more the first six months. Congratulations to the following clubs: Seal Beach-22, La Habra Host-7, Orange County Central-3, Diamond Bar Breakfast-2, Pomona Host-2, Stanton-2, and Walnut/Diamond Bar-2.

In the District's Plan of Action it was projected to be a +33 by December 31st; however we were short 20 because the projected new club did not come on line as planned. We have a Campus Club (Western University Health Sciences School of Optometry) coming on line this month and Westminster next month. We started progress in San Dimas with 12 paid members and 40 prospects and another 30 prospects for La Verne, the result of the Extension Workshop and canvassing.

The team of John & Wanda Barnett from England, Arkansas was awesome! We received plenty of tools for our tool box in which to help all of our clubs to grow or rebuild. During the Upland Host breakfast meeting we attended with the Trainers on Thursday morning January 21st, PCC Ed Bordenkircher said, "this was the best training he had in 40 years." Thank you PCC Ed for that glowing remark. I am still confident that the original goal of 130 members the District Governor Team projected will be met by June 30 with four new clubs at 25 each chartered and the continuous growth in our clubs. The Team is available for one-day or ½ day workshops to grow clubs. Contact me, 1st VDG Ken Sherwood or any member of the MERLO Team to schedule. One afternoon of canvassing will net at least five new members.

The enhancement of leadership and the recipe for extension were displayed during the week of January 16-22 when LCI New Club Development specialists PCC John Barnett and PDG Wanda Barnett came to District 4-L4 to present Certified Guiding Lion training and a phase one Extension workshop.

18 Lions covering all three regions, plus the governor team, availed themselves of CGL training on Tuesday, January 18th at the San Dimas public library. The three and a half hour class taught Lions how to organize a club and help the new Lions get up and running and sustain the new club for its first two years.

The Guiding Lion certificates will be mailed from LCI. After serving as a Guiding Lion for the prescribed period, they receive a Guiding Lion lapel pin and join a very select group of Lion leaders throughout the world.

The Barnetts came to us from Arkansas but there was no significant language barrier. Their knowledge and humor kept all attendees interested and entertained.

On Wednesday the 19th, the Lions Barnett conducted the extension workshop for the same 21 Lions. Methods of canvassing, recruiting and registering charter members were absorbed and then used in some role playing to hone our skills.

After lunch, provided by First Lady in Waiting, Marilyne Sherwood, 11 of the attendees hit the sidewalks of San Dimas and began to build the new San Dimas Lions club. All of the canvassers had interesting stories to tell of instant success (the two brothers that own and operate a personal training facility)

and gentle turndowns. Many San Dimas business people were educated about Lions and some joined on the spot. Others gave it serious consideration but wanted to know more about us.

In three days of canvassing with five teams, eight new charter members were signed up and paid or asked to be invoiced. An additional 30 or more good prospects were given brochures and information and expressed an interest in attending an orientation/organization meeting on Tuesday, February 8th in San Dimas.

On Friday, the canvassing spread to La Verne where another twenty plus good prospect were interviewed and told about the information meeting for a La Verne Lions club on Monday, February 7th at University of LaVerne.

When I meditated on the word Guidance, I kept seeing "dance" at the end of the word.



Getting new members is a great start and certainly essential to the growth of a Club. But from there, the challenge is RETENTION.

The Seal Beach Lions Club has never had a problem attracting new Lions. The Club is very active in community events so their exposure is prominent. It's human nature to want to jump on the bandwagon. Keeping those members is another story.

How often has your club worked hard to bring in those 2 or 3 new members just to see them leave within a year? How about those veteran Lions that seem to disappear after years of service? The Seal Beach Lions have come to recognize that retention is just as important as recruitment.

We print out sign-up sheets and think that passing them around at a meeting will engage members to participate. The Seal Beach Lions are on a mission. The goal set at the beginning of the year by Membership Chairman Scott Newton was 20 new members. Surpassing this goal, we already have 33 enthusiastic new Cubs on board making the Seal Beach Lions Club the 4th largest Lions Club in California! With this, Lion Scott and President Allyn Mattox recognized that the Club has the responsibility of getting these new Lions involved.

Letter to Governor Norm sent from Seal Beach Lions Club Membership Chairman Scott Newton

"I want to share with you another Membership Success Story.

Last evening we held a <u>'New Member Orientation' for 19 of our new</u> <u>members and 6 prospective members</u>. Six guiding Lions acted as facilitators. It was by far the largest orientation held by our club in over 25 years.

Pizza, Beer, Wine, Soft Drinks, Salad and Dessert was served to all who attended. President Allyn served up the homemade pizza. I was the main presenter with support from Lions Allyn, Ray, Mike H, Grant and Marcia.

The orientation started with the PowerPoint presentation created by PDG Dan Mayer. Thank you Lion Danny! Following this, I made a presentation that covered everything about the Seal Beach Lions Club. It was fun, informative and interactive.

The most exciting part of the evening was when we led a discussion on how members personally can make a difference and <u>challenged the new</u> <u>Lions to create some new Service projects led by new Lions</u>. They were challenged to come up with Signature projects for the Seal Beach Lions Club class of 2010-2011. An amazing brainstorming session led the group to select three projects that will be developed and brought to our Board for approval.

The first is an <u>Eisenhower Park Beautification Project</u>. Lions will refurbish all of the park benches in the East Park, West Park and around the entrance to the pier. Twelve of the new Lions signed up for this project that will be led by new Leo's Mark Kavanaugh and Camille Romano. They plan to create a project plan, get permission from the city, and present the project to our Board in February so that they can complete the project in time for the 10K Run on April 2nd.

The second project has already been dubbed <u>Lions Roar for Autism</u>. New Lions Teri, Katherine and Meagan took the challenge we gave them earlier and gave us a detailed account of their project idea. The project will take place in April (Autism Awareness Month) at Marina Park and will have an educational component for parents, a learning component for autistic children, and a FUN component for all. The event will include a BBQ lunch cooked by new Lions. Eighteen new Lions signed up to work this event including some 'prospective members'. They too will present this to the board on Wednesday.

The third project is a <u>Wine Tasting Event showcasing Young Artists Works</u>. This project is still in the exploratory stage and will be headed up by new Lions Bill and Kara.

Besides the three projects, we have two of our new Lions who want to head up new committees for our club. Lion Laura wants to lead an Environmental Services committee and Lion Richard would like to start an International Relations committee. And finally, new Lion Les will use his influence to secure a reservation at the Weapons Station Beach for a Lions Beach Party in August. Literally every new Lion there signed up for at least one project or committee.

As you already know, President Allyn challenged us to grow our membership and as of now our membership is at 133 and we are still growing. Once the growth began we realized that the only way to ensure good retention is to convert them from being Lions members to Lions by getting them involved. Knowing that we are somewhat 'project light' in the Spring, President Allyn asked if we could find new projects for our new Lions and you can see the results above.

This was a hugely successful and beneficial event for both our new Lions and our club. We also got commitments from some of the guests to join our club at the next meeting."







Hearing & Speech Action News

Little Known Fact Smoking is bad for your hearing!

And a new study published in the journal Tobacco Control reports that inhaling second-hand smoke is also bad for your hearing. Statistics collected from 1999 to 2004 identified 3307 self-identified non-smokers aged 20 to 69 whose blood levels of cotinine showed that they were exposed to second-hand smoke. Of those who formerly smoked, 60% had hearing loss, while of those who had never smoked, 35% had hearing loss. Overall the non-smokers with high cotinine levels were about a third more likely to have hearing loss than those whose levels showed they were not exposed to others' smoking.

The hearing loss related to smoking or exposure to smoking differs from age or noise induced hearing loss. It is less dominated by high-frequency loss, which makes it more similar to the loss in people with diabetes or cardiovascular disease. Says David Fabry, PhD, lead author of this study, "We don't know exactly what amount of exposure is too much but the threshold for damage is very low. No exposure is the only safe level".



LION FRANCES NGUYEN OF THE WESTMINSTER COMMUNITY LIONS WAS FEATURED RECENTLY IN THE OC REGISTER

Frances Nguyen remembers the Tet Festival when it was just a block party on Hoover Street in Westminster.

In 1982, as waves of Vietnamese refugees were pouring into California and Orange County after the Fall of Saigon in 1975, the Tet Festival, which heralds the Lunar New Year, was a source of comfort for those who were hurting.

It was not only an opportunity for them to celebrate their culture and the homeland they left behind, but also a way to fundraise for the hundreds of thousands of boat people who left Vietnam with only the shirts on their backs and had reached American shores with a dream and a prayer.

Nguyen, then a young student and member of the Union of Vietnamese Student Associations, which organized the festival, also tapped Vietnamese journalists to create magazines during Tet to keep the home-sick community informed. Thirty years later, Nguyen says, this is home.

"Thirty years is a big milestone for us," she said. "We have not only been able to help ourselves, but also help the community around us."

The festival, which is entirely run by volunteers, celebrates its 30th anniversary and the Year of the Cat from Friday, Feb. 4, to Sunday, Feb. 6, at Garden Grove Park, 9301 Westminster Blvd. GG. <u>www.tetfestival.org</u>

Over the last 10 years the festival has given more than \$1 million to the Boy Scouts, the city of Garden Grove, sister city organizations, college scholarships and leadership conferences. Nearly 100,000 walk through the gates over the festival weekend.

This year's Tet Festival will feature for the first time an eightminute fireworks show as the grand finale. The opening ceremony on Feb. 5 will also honor former festival chairpersons and organizers such as Nguyen, who was also the first Vietnamese American woman to be president of the Westminster Chamber of Commerce. There will be more than 40 food booths, 80 vendor booths and more than 20 for sponsors. The festival will also feature carnival rides and jump houses.





Congratulations to our patients and their families. And to our physicians, scientists, nurses and staff for reaching a new milestone in City of Hope's world-renowned Bone Marrow Transplantation Program ... **10,000 TRANSPLANTS!**

DUARTE, Calif., January 13, 2011—City of Hope, which helped pioneer bone marrow transplantation three and a half decades ago, performed its 10,000th transplant on Jan. 13, becoming one of the first institutions in the world to reach this milestone.

Bone marrow or stem cell transplantation—collectively known as hematopoietic cell transplantation (HCT)—is a complex, often lifesaving procedure in which stem cells are used to help cure patients of their cancer. It is most often used for patients battling diseases like leukemia, lymphoma and myeloma.

"Day to day, our work is all about a single life at stake that we're trying to save," said Stephen J. Forman, M.D., Francis and Kathleen McNamara Distinguished Chair in Hematology and Hematopoietic Cell Transplantation and chair of the Department of Hematology & Hematopoietic Cell Transplantation. "Reaching 10,000, you think about the many people—children and adults—who have benefited from City of Hope's care and research — the many wonderful people who have come here trusting us to care for them, hoping for a cure."

In the nearly 35 years since City of Hope physicians performed one of the nation's first successful bone marrow transplants, the institution has helped transplantation evolve into a gold standard treatment for several diseases.

On Jan. 13, 2011, City of Hope performed its 10,000th transplant on a patient with advanced leukemia who received stem cells from an unrelated volunteer donor who was a compatible match.

City of Hope performed its first successful bone marrow transplant in 1976 on a young college student from Indiana

who was diagnosed with acute myeloid leukemia. His physician told him he should prepare himself for inevitable death. But his cousin, a physician in Los Angeles, knew that City of Hope was launching a bone marrow transplant program. The young student went to City of Hope to undergo a bone marrow transplant, and he has remained in remission for 35 years.

Each year, he and thousands of other survivors, their families and hospital staff attend City of Hope's Bone Marrow Transplant Reunion, a rite of spring held on the Duarte, Calif. campus.

City of Hope currently performs nearly 500 bone marrow transplant procedures each year. During transplant, patients typically undergo high doses of chemotherapy and/or radiation that helps eradicate the cancer cells but also destroy their bone marrow and immune systems. Patients then receive stem cells from one of several sources which then rebuild their blood and immune systems. Different sources of stem cells can be utilized depending on the disease and the availability of stem cell donors. Autologous transplants isolate and use the patient's own healthy stem cells. Related donor allogeneic transplants use donor stem cells from a compatible relative or sibling, while unrelated donor allogeneic transplants use cells from altruistic volunteers who registered themselves as potential bone marrow donors. Umbilical cord blood stem cells also can be used. City of Hope recently was recognized by the National Marrow Donor Program registry as the only center in 2010 to achieve above average survival rates in unrelated transplants for five consecutive years.

"All of our research and treatment efforts reflect our commitment to patients and their families—recognizing each of them as a dignified human being with a story to tell and a life to live," said Forman. "They also are our partners in developing new therapies for those who will come to us tomorrow for care. There are a significant number of people who are alive today because they were and are a part of something we did at City of Hope that was both bold and new."

City of Hope laboratory and clinical scientists continue to make transplants safer and more effective, and help extend the length and quality of patients' lives. New transplant procedures are improving cure rates, extending the procedure to older patients and expanding the use of transplants to diseases beyond leukemia, lymphoma and multiple myeloma.

Greetings Lions of District 4-L4,



LIONS ROSE PARADE FLOAT DECORATING






