Late summer, early Autumn is the best time for planting trees. This allows the trees to take root before the winter dormant period. Now, it's time for District 4-L4 clubs to move from planning to planting. Garden Grove Host appears to be first to plant trees with the approval and help of the City of Garden Grove. GG Host president Chuck Lake has pledged one tree per member (46) with 18 going into the ground around Big Ron's auto body shop with the remainder throughout the city, according to Lion Ron Pierce. Garden Grove is requiring 15gal. size trees (very survivable) with most other cities contacted requiring 5 gal. to 20 gal. size trees. The City of Tustin is apparently asking for 40 gal. size. Explain the world wide Lions project and try to work with your city on reasonable size limits. Lets keep the cost down as much as possible. I am happy to report that so far over 302,000 trees have been planted by Lions around the world. Start digging.

Don't Refuse

Since California Friends in Sight (CLFIS) is new to 4L4 and MD4 an explanation of the project seems in order.

CLFIS is based in Southern California and primarily does vision screenings with recycled eyeglasses. The most recent screening was in Grand Terrace, Ca on July 30th. Three hundred and seventy people were seen at this screening and 334 were fitted with recycled glasses. These screenings and recycled grasses are all completely FREE OF CHARGE. The glasses are those that have been picked up by Lions clubs members primarily in the 4L4 and 4L5 areas. When doing a vision screening, CLFIS carries 12,000 pairs of collected recycled glasses with them that have been cleaned, disinfected, verified and cataloged into storage containers based on power, lens style and frame styles.

During a typical year, CLFIS has done 20 to 24 vision screenings in Southern California and Northern Mexico. Local Lion's clubs request the vision screening for their area and supply a site, local Lion volunteers to assist the CLFIS staff with the screening, and refreshments for the workers. Examples of vision screenings done this year include the Cucamonga District host in February with the screening of 206 adults and children with free recycled glasses. The screenings generally begin at 8 am and end around 3 pm. Other vision screenings include Murrieta with 115 people seen, Thermal 360, Yucaipa 257, Apple Valley with 316 screenings and in April CLFIS went to Sonora-Baja on a 3 day trip and 728 happy people left with recycled glasses. CLFIS at the vision screenings also assess for ocular conditions that could lead to blindness. In just the above six screenings 2,600 people were seen, of which 72 were identified with pathological conditions covering macular degeneration, diabetic retinopathy, glaucoma, optic atrophy, strabismus and cataracts, to name a few. Once those conditions were identified the patients were given advice on seeking further care for their conditions.

Since CLFIS have recently been approved as a MD4 project we look forward to working with all MD4 Lions clubs throughout the MD4 area.

To clear up the mystery, hear it is straight from Lions Clubs International, "the Global Leadership Team (GLT) provides for an enhanced focus on leadership development, which is critical to the future vitality of our association. The GLT directs its efforts toward identifying and cultivating effective leaders through active training and leadership development initiatives, while providing necessary information, guidance and motivation.

<u>The GLT structure</u> encompasses representation at the international, multiple district, single district and district levels and includes district governor teams, providing a comprehensive global platform for developing more qualified leaders from the club level up, while encouraging regional training and development approaches to address local needs."

Well, I'm sure **that** really cleared it up for you all. OK, how about the Sheila Reader's Digest version ~ GLT takes the place of the "L" in MERLO. It is a streamlined program starting with the International President of Lions Clubs International down to the individual Lions Club. SEAL BEACH LIONS CONTROL GRAFFITI

In late June, the City of Seal Beach called the Seal Beach Lions for help in removing graffiti on private property. Under the leadership of Lion Ray Longoria, a team of Lions came together to combat the problem. The team started with a specific problem identified by the city and then moved to sweeping every street and alley in Old Town. In three weeks, the Lions removed or covered more than 400 incidences of graffiti. Some were very obvious and others quite discrete.



For only a \$200 investment they acquired environmental chemicals designed specifically to remove various types of graffiti. From the very beginning, they had aesthetics in mind and concentrated their efforts on removal rather than simply covering it up. Lion Cathy Newton commented: "I was amazed at how much graffiti we have in Old Town. We rode our bikes or walked every ally for three weeks cleaning them up everywhere. Now our bikes rides include checking for new graffiti".

While there was certainly a lot to clean up, it is hard to say how old all of this graffiti really is. Some of the taggings were dated as old as 2005. The Lions have also partnered with the State of California, Consolidated Disposal and Southern California Edison whose properties have been affected as well. The Lions also met several residents who are acting as their 'eyes in old town' helping identify problems when they occur.



"This project has made us several new friends in Old Town" says Lion Scott Newton. "Business owners and residents all seem to really appreciate our efforts"

The Lions have established a graffiti hotline for businesses and residents to report graffiti problems. When notified, the Lions will respond to the problem in less than 24 hours. Future plans include expanding the program to all parts of Seal Beach.

What I did on my Summer Vacation GIVING THE GIFT OF SIGHT

It was just before 6am when the phone rang at my parent's lake house in Wisconsin. Being up already, I answered the call that was from the Wisconsin Lions Eye Bank. A person had died that previous evening and their eyes were harvested and needed to be immediately transported to the Lions Eye Bank in Madison.

My Dad is a Lion in Winchester, Wisconsin and had signed up for emergency transport duty for eye tissue destined for transplant at the Lions Eye Institute in Madison (350 miles away). There are 1,500 Lions in Wisconsin who are registered to transport 'eyes' and I was privileged to join my Dad on this mission to truly help give someone the gift of sight.

Within 15 minutes of receiving the call we both had on Lions shirts and our respective club badges and were on our way. Our assignment was to pick up the eye tissue from the Emergency room of a remote local hospital and transport it another Emergency room in Wausau which is about half way to Madison.

We arrived at the Emergency Room in Woodruff after a 40 minute drive and picked up a box that contained a cooler with the eye tissue. Emergency Room personnel were expecting us so the pick up was fast.



We safety "seat belted' the package and took off driving. Knowing that I would probably not get a speeding ticket, you can imagine how fast I drove. We drove south another 2 hours to a hospital in Wausau (Central Wisconsin). Because we were early, the Emergency room personnel took possession of the package and secured it for another Lion who was to transport it the remaining distance to the Lions Eye Bank in Madison.



Our job was done once the transport to Wausau was complete but we still had a 2 ½ hour drive back to our lake house.This was certainly a first for me and I felt quite privileged to be part of this ongoing service project by the Lions of Wisconsin. This was an experience that made me truly feel as if I was helping give the gift of sight.

DID YOU KNOW?



A man's job may affect his risk of lung cancer. While cigarette smoking is by far the biggest factor contributing to lung cancer, Italian researchers found that job factors like exposure to chemicals can play a major role. The scientists studied more than 4,200 people, about half of whom had lung cancer, and found that men who worked in jobs known to increase lung cancer risk — mining and metalworking, for example - were 74 percent more likely to have the disease. The strongest associations were seen for ceramic and pottery jobs as well as manufacturing of brick and non-iron metals. Over all, about five percent of men's lung cancer risk appeared to stem from occupation, according to the researchers. The scientists found a similar correlation in women, but the study contained too few women to be certain of the numbers. The National Cancer Institute has information on how to prevent lung cancer, which can be found at their website, <u>www.cancer.gov</u>.



Year-Round Growth Program By: PDG Norm MacKenzie, GMT Coordinator

LCI's Year-Round Growth Program recognizes Lions and their respective club for member invitation successes during a given fiscal year. Lions should be excited about inviting others to club meetings. If your club meetings don't offer networking and fun, then you need to communicate with the Club Membership Director and/or the Club President on how you think meetings can be more fun for all the members.

It is the "The District Governor Team," and GMT's goal for clubs to have a net two (2) for the year which is an overall net gain for the District of 72 members plus two (2) new clubs (20 charter members each) equals = 112 new members added to the District's 1,154 members will put the District at 1,266 members.

When inviting prospective members, let them know LIONS are Loving Individuals Offering Needed Service! Also when recruiting young people, let them know Lions offer Leadership, Impact, Opportunity, Networking, & Service. Once they become members, encourage them to present new ideas and let them organize and run the event. That's offering new cubs the Opportunity to build Leadership skills which have a positive Impact on Service to the community while Networking with others to make it happen.

Individual Invitation Awards

Each Lion who sponsors a new member is eligible to receive a certificate of sponsorship from the international president. Both the sponsorship certificate and new member certificate are included in the New Member Kit, which may ordered free of charge through the **Club Supplies Department.**

Additionally, Lions who sponsor three (3) or more members during a given fiscal year will receive the Year-Round Growth Membership Excellence Lapel Pin.

Club Invitation Awards

Clubs that bring in the number of members in their category, as specified below, during a given fiscal year receive a Year-Round Growth Membership Excellence Banner Patch. The club categories, and number of new members necessary to receive the patch for the category, are as follows:

- Clubs with 21 or fewer members: bring in 3 or more new members
- Clubs with 22-40 members: bring in 5 or more new members
- Clubs with 41 or more members: bring in 8 or more new members

Additionally, the top three clubs (one from each of the three size categories above) from each constitutional area with the greatest number of new members and positive net growth during the fiscal year will receive a Lions Clubs International Flag Set.

Year Round Growth Outreach Strategy

Consider utilizing a calendar to guide or focus your invitation efforts. Give each month a different membership demographic, enabling your club to concentrate on the wide range of potential members available in your community. Consider the following sample calendar:

- July/August Women
- September Professional partners
- October Traditional membership growth campaign
- November/December Students
- January Leos and former Lions
- February Target demographic groups
- March Spouses/family
- April Worldwide Induction Day
- May/June Retention focus

Utilize local resources such as, Chamber of Commerce Business Directory, and City New Business License Lists as well as friends, neighbors, relatives, church, and business associations. Invite potential members to participate in your community service project.



WHITE CANE

In 1921, James Biggs, a photographer from Bristol, England, became blind following an accident. Because he was feeling

uncomfortable with the amount of traffic around his home, he painted his walking stick white to be more easily visible.

In 1930, the late George A. Bonham, President of the Peoria Lions Club (Illinois) introduced the idea of using the white cane with a red band as a means of assisting the blind in independent mobility. The Peoria Lions approved the idea, white canes were made and distributed, and the Peoria City Council adopted an ordinance giving the bearers the right-of-way to cross the street. News of the club's activity spread quickly to other Lions clubs throughout the United States, and their visually handicapped friends experimented with the white canes. Overwhelming acceptance of the white cane idea by the blind and sighted alike quickly gave cane users a unique method of identifying their special need for travel consideration among their sighted counterparts.

Today white cane laws are on the books of every state in the US and many other countries, providing blind persons a legal status in traffic. The white cane now universally acknowledges that the bearer is blind.

Register for the Great California Shake Out

The 2011 Great California ShakeOut is October 20, 2011, and over eight million Californians are expected to participate. Have you registered yet?

Registering is easy, and if you have registered in prior years, renewing is even easier. Just follow these steps:

Go to www.shakeout.org.

Click on the big "Register Now!" or "Log in" (for prior participants). These are located in the orange box on the top left under "The Great California ShakeOut" logo.

The directions are easy to follow. If you are a prior participant and have forgotten your access code, your code will be promptly emailed to you within seconds.

You are allowed to register for yourself and family and separately for your business, school, district or other group.

The only requirement of the ShakeOut is that you somehow participate in earthquake preparedness. The Earthquake Country Alliance, which coordinates the event and of which we are associate members, prefers that people practice "Drop, Cover and Hold On!" sometime in close proximity to that day, but the timing is flexible. Try to schedule a "Drop, Cover and Hold On!" for a Lions meeting.

Learning to do the "Drop, Cover and Hold On!" properly is extremely important. The process has evolved as experience and research continue to show the safest way to respond to an earthquake. Since we have been taught under the old guidelines to duck under a table, our natural, but unwise, instinct is to try to run to the nearest table. However, in a large earthquake, if we try to walk or run, we would be thrown to the ground and injured.

The refined "Drop, Cover and Hold On!" guidelines say to drop where you are and cover your head with your arms and hands. If you can crawl under a sturdy table or to a solid piece of furniture, hold on tightly to the stable item so you won't be hurled back and forth. If not under a table, have one hand over your head and one hand holding on.

WHAT COULD THE AMERICA OF YESTERDAY TEACH THE AMERICA OF TOMORROW?

You'd think they planned it. Both Fountain Valley residents, both with a love for cooking, and both are blind. Terry Coakley and Scott Quinlan won top awards for their culinary creations at this year's Orange County Fair cooking competition. But it's all purely coincidence.

Oakley nabbed her division's Best in Show award for her Orange Jack Marmalade, the recipe for which includes Jack Daniels. The whiskey gives the spread "more of a warmth than a sweetness," she says. She also won a first-place ribbon for her Champagne and Roses Jelly.

Using a recipe that been in his family for decades, Quinlan too placed first for his barbeque sauce, and he's certainly not giving up his secret. He would only divulge that he uses a special blend of herbs and spices, and it takes up to 12 hours to cook down just right.

Quinlan lost his sight six years ago due to complications with diabetes, but he's been making his sauce for a good 30 years. "I've been in the kitchen since I was 5 years old," he said. "I live on the Food Network and I'm a big barbeque guy."

Coakley, who has been blind for around 17 years after a combination of medical problems, didn't decide to take up canning her own jams and jellies until 2004, after a plum tree in her yard "went crazy." She's been entering the fair contests ever since, having won her first Best In Show last year, while this was Quinlan's first time entering.

Although they are clearly talented, both admit to a few challenges presented by cooking without sight. Quinlan has been burned a few times and enlists a friend to help with the canning process. He also uses measuring cups with Braille markings, but other than that, he says he doesn't really have any other difficulties.

Coakley has also been burned quite a few times and has made some modifications to help protect herself from hazards. "I have learned not to play with knives anymore," she said. "For peaches, for example, I scoop the fruit out instead of chopping it."

The two culinary artists have yet another common interest: advocacy. Quinlan in a member of the Orange Lions Club and Coakley lists membership with the Woman's Club, the Fountain Valley Chamber of Commerce and the Advisory Committee for the Disabled.
