School, Lions Club collect eyeglasses for the needy

Two Huntington Beach groups partnered to "bring the gift of sight" to those less fortunate. Brethren Christian Junior & Senior High School and the Huntington Beach Host Lions Club joined forces for a used eyeglass collection drive this fall.

Each month, students focus on a different cause for a service project. For October, students wanted to partner with the local Lions Club in its eyeglass-recycling project. We felt this was an especially applicable project because, as Christians, we want to emulate what Jesus did. The Bible tells us that Jesus gave sight to the blind man. We can, in our own way, have a similar impact through this project.

Joe Whaling, president of the Huntington Beach Host Lions, and John Doogan, Huntington Beach coordinator of the Fountain Valley Leo Club (youth Lions club), attended a school assembly to introduce students to Lions Clubs International's mission and to present the eyeglass collection project.

"We are very excited about this partnership and hope that it leads to more involvement together in the future," Doogan said.

Students decorated their

boxes that they positioned at their churches and other businesses near their homes in October.

We hoped to present the Huntington Beach Lions Club with 1,000 eyeglasses for those in need. We were absolutely thrilled when we counted up 1,672 eyeglasses and hearing aids.

Doogan has promised to come back to the school in the spring with video footage of low-income people actually receiving the glasses collected by Brethren Christian students.

Twenty-five dollar gift cards were given to the students who were able to bring in the largest number of glasses or hearing aids. Seventh-grade students Madison Zone and Sam Skarin accumulated 73 pairs each. Ninth-grade twin sisters Amanda and Carina Lee gathered a whopping 327 pairs of glasses. When asked how they were able to collect so many, the girls simply replied they used all the ideas that were suggested, and they worked. The box they placed at the Starbucks coffeeshop on Atlanta and Beach, was filled to overflowing several times






Again, kudos to our secretaries for the monthly reports. You are all doing an great job. I am here for you, anytime.

Fantastic Foothill Region

As I write this article, I am preparing to have total right knee replacement surgery. While you won't see me at Lions events during my early recovery, I am sure I will find my way to a computer and telephone before too much time passes.

As I take time to reflect about my favorite Lions things, I am struck by the plethora of ways Lions help their communities and the world. I think this is especially apparent in the holiday season when Lions do so much to make the lives of those in need less bleak or to bring joy in people's lives. Yes, Lions do make a difference, and it's not just during the holidays, but every day all year long.

One of the most valuable gifts we can give any time of year is the donation of books to children through the Lions Reading Action Program. Getting books into the hands of children, especially in programs where the children get to select and own books, is powerfully transformational. According to several research studies, 2/3's of students living in poverty have no books in the home, and even many students in higher-than-poverty circumstances have never owned an age-appropriate book. When a child receives ownership of a book, he/she usually reads it over and over and over. This ownership improves his/her reading, increases academic performance in all subjects in school, creates a more positive attitude toward learning, and ultimately sets the course for higher education and improved employment.

Because I believe so strongly in the value of getting books in the hands of children, I have been pursuing information on how we Lions can purchase books to give to children at deeply discounted prices (usually 40 to 80% off). Lions Clubs International has formed a literacy partnership with Scholastic Books, which will send you a catalog and a participant ID as soon as it receives your application. Other than being a registered participant, the only requirement is that the books are being given through a Lions literacy program to individual students, not to the libraries, not to the schools, not to our own children nor children of friends. Cabinet Secretary Joan Parks is forwarding the registration form and instructions to all clubs in the district.

Pomona Host Lions has been continuously serving Pomona for almost 93 years, since it was chartered on March 4, 1921. Richard Sugerman is the 2013-2014 president and Beverly Sugerman is the secretary. The club meets on the first and third Thursdays of the month at 12:10 pm at Pomona Valley Mining Company. At our general membership meetings we have guest speakers who address the club on many timely topics.

Currently we have about 55 members, ranging from college age to their 80's. New members receive an orientation and we encourage them to earn the Proud Lion award. We are currently working on the Club Excellence Process.

Last year we started a Leos Club at Golden Springs Middle School, which was officially chartered in February. The Leos are quite active in their school. The Lions Club advisor is Frank Guzman. Pomona Host Lions also extended WesternU Lions Club. They are very active in working at health screenings throughout the year.

One of our signature activities is our Flag Day Project. Volunteers read a book about the American flag to children in first grade classes in Pomona schools. At the end of the presentation, each child receives a flag in a flag stand made by club members, and the book and a stuffed plush lion are given to the teacher for the classroom. Another signature project is our PlarnFests. Plarn is plastic yarn that is made from the strips cut from plastic bags. The strips are strung together and wound into balls, like yarn. The plarn is then used to crochet ground mats for the homeless.

In support of vision services each year we hold a Sight for Success Campaign during November and December. The purpose is to raise funds to pay for eye exams and glasses for Pomona Unified School District students who could not afford them otherwise. Certificates cost \$50.

Our club also collects used eyeglasses for both Lions in Sight and California Friends in Sight and in the last two years has helped provide volunteers for Friends in Sight vision screenings. The most recent was held last March at Marshall Middle School, where over 400 people were screened and most received glasses. We also collect used hearing aids and donate them to Southern California Sight and Hearing Foundation. We are extremely grateful to new member Carmen Morris, of Christensen Hearing Center, for her sizeable donation of over 300 used hearing aids.

Much of our service is directed to the city of Pomona. We participate in the GREAT Campout for older elementary school and middle school children by sponsoring a giant bubble booth. In the spring, the club undertakes a project as part of the city's Beautification Day. This Christmas season will be the third one when we have helped provide toys and games for the Pomona Police Department's Santa Cop Program. We also collect food for Inland Valley Hope Partners once a month at our meetings, during the summer at the Summer Concerts in the Park presented by the Pomona Concert Band, and also at the band's winter concert. Members of the club assist with the community Science Fair by helping with check-in and serving as judges.

We are also involved in projects for the Pomona Unified School District. Each year since 2004-05, our club has presented about \$5000 per year to classroom teachers in the form of mini-grants of \$250 to an individual and \$500 to a team so that teachers can buy needed supplementary materials that the school budget cannot cover. We also participate in the Nancy McCracken Learning Expo each spring and we are involved in literacy programs in the schools. Volunteers help in classrooms by working on reading and math skills with small groups of children.

Our major fundraiser each year is our Bowl-a-thon and Silent Auction. This year's event will be held on February 22, 2014 at Oak Tree Lanes in Diamond Bar. The money raised is used to help support a number of projects, including but not limited to LCIF, Lions Camp at Teresita Pines, District 4-L4 Teen Recognition, District 4-L4 Sight and Hearing Program, Student Speakers Foundation, Lions Float Inc., University of La Verne's REACH Program, the YMCA, Pomona Concert Band, Save the Pomona Public Library, the Braille Institute bus, and the City of Hope.

In short, there is no lack of opportunity for our members to demonstrate their commitment to the Lions motto, "WE SERVE."

ACTIVITIES AROUND THE FOOTHILL REGION

CHINO VALLEY LIONS recently conducted the installation of officers and induction of new members for their two Leo two clubs.

CUCAMONGA DISTRICT HOST LIONS spent November 9th working with Lions Friends in Sight to help over 250 community members get vision screenings, prescriptions, examinations, advice and glasses. Their equipment and staff made the day easy and productive. It takes many volunteers to pull a day like this off, and thanks go out to the Lions from Seal Beach, Apple Valley, students from Los Osos Key Club, and all the Lions from our club as well as all the helpful "blue shirt" FIS Lions. In all we had 54 volunteers! Lion Pat Dundas from the Cucamonga District Host Club fostered a partnership with Essilor, a world-wide leader in corrective lens manufacturing. Essilor donated a brand new Auto Lensometer (valued at over \$1300) to our club for Friends In Sight. The Cucamonga District Host Club was honored this month to be visited by the District Governor Lion Sheila Casteel and her cabinet. She offered a wonderful presentation about the future of our club and "Making The World A Better Place." It takes many hands to make the world a better place. We talked about meeting our member's needs, taking time to listen to our members, the community, and create partnerships to work together.

DIAMOND BAR BREAKFAST LIONS Leo activities continue to be a major part of the DB Breakfast involvement with the Chaparral Middle School Leos and Diamond Bar High School Leos. This includes:

- Jack & Wanda presented a class on Leos at the MD4 Leadership Forum in Burbank.
- First Leo District Meeting attended by Chaparral and Diamond Bar High School Leos and Lions Jack & Wanda.
- Diamond Bar High School Leo Club worked the "Starry Night" at Pantera Elementary School.

- Diamond Bar High School Leos delivered thank you cards to Veterans at the Long Beach VA Hospital and Loma Linda VA Hospital.
- Peace Poster entries from three schools.
- Both Leos clubs and the Lions held a canned food drive and potluck picnic. The canned food will be donated to the Walnut Food Bank

The club also collected used eyeglasses to be recycled and old blankets for the homeless.

ONTARIO HOST LIONS December kicks off with a lunch with Santa for Lincoln School, a school for children with special needs. On December 3, Santa and his elves and fellow Lions will host the lunch in order for each student to be able to receive their gift from Santa. This year the new SJVC Ontario Lions Branch club will be wrapping all of the students' presents and participating in the lunch too. The Ontario Host Christmas Basket Program, an annual event, kicks off on Wednesday, December 18. Their goal this year is to feed 200 families. The Branch Club and Chaffey High School Leos will provide the muscles to sort and package approximately 40 items per family. Lion Dave Flatten is instrumental in making this event happen and generously provides warehouse space for the sorting and packing. Saturday, December 21, the baskets will receive their perishable items and distributed to local families in need.

ONTARIO-UPLAND LIONS had a very successful Steakhouse fundraiser, netting \$1450. They continue to collect eyeglasses, knit baby hats, and are planning a miniature Christmas tree decorating evening, with the trees being donated to a local convalescent home. They are also sending Christmas cards via the Red Cross, to injured service personnel in various hospitals. With eight activities to report in November, the club raised over \$2,000 for its charities fund and provided almost 200 hours of support for activities benefiting youth, sight and health related and the environment.



Yes, it's that time of the year again. The Lions float for the Rose Parade on January 1, 2014 needs to be decorated. Phoenix Decorating Company has designed and built the float. We will be decorating in the Rose Palace building at: 835 S. Raymond Avenue, Pasadena, California 91105.

I have been appointed by Governor Sheila Casteel to coordinate District 4-L4's decorating dates. This year's dates and times are on **Saturday, December 14th** (1:00 pm to 5:00 pm) and **Saturday, December 28th** there will be two shifts (8:00 am to 12:00 noon & 12:30 pm to 3:30 pm). Leos Dec. 26 four shifts 8-12noon, 12:30-3:30pm, 3:30-6:00pm and 6:30-9:00pm.

Please call or send me an e-mail message with the names of your decorators, club name and a contact phone number. All sign-ups are first come, first serve. I will also maintain a wait list too. Here are some instructions for all decorators.

- 1. Please do not bring radios, iPods, jewelry or purses. You need to hear instructions at all times. Bring your I.D. and money only. Fanny packs work great.
- 2. Wear old but warm clothing and sturdy shoes with closed toe and heel. Tie back long hair.
- 3. Fire lanes must be kept open at all times and the area around the float should be kept clean.
- 4. Please do not expect to use the office phones. Incoming calls will not be accepted for workers and no paging will be allowed from the office. Only emergency calls will be taken.
- 5. No one is allowed inside the building during judging. When you are asked to step outside, please do so promptly and remember to take out any personal items with you.
- 6. All breaks are to be taken outside.
- 7. Volunteers are here to work. There will be some not-so-glamorous jobs that need to be done besides decorating. It all has to be done.
- 8. No smoking is allowed in the buildings.
- 9. No more that 3 people are allowed on scaffolding at a time.
- 10. Do not wear flowers at any time, even after the floats have left the building.
- 11. Please sign-in with your coordinator when you arrive at your float and when you leave. Sign-in sheets are collected daily.
- 12. If you show up unannounced, you may not work on the Lions float.
- 13. Anyone observed working unsafely may be asked to leave.

HEARING & SPEECH ACTION NEWS

ASSISTIVE LISTENING DEVICES

These devices, little known by the general public, are useful to people who do or do not have hearing loss. Some are used with hearing aids; some are used without hearing aids.

Certain communication needs cannot be solved by the use of hearing aids alone, and special devices have been developed to solve these problems. ALDs can increase the loudness of a desired sound, like a radio or television, a public speaker, an actor or someone speaking in a noisy place, without increasing the loudness of the background noises. This is because the microphone of the ALD is placed close to the speaker, while the microphone of the hearing aid is always close to the listener.

There are many assistive listening devices available today, from sophisticated systems used in theaters and auditoriums to small personal systems. The personal systems are all designed to carry sound directly to the listener and to minimize or eliminate environmental noises. Some of these systems are designed for classrooms or small groups. Others are personal systems, helpful for one-on-one conversations in places such as automobiles, meeting rooms and restaurants.

TV listening systems (as used by my brother-in-law) are designed for listening to TV, radio or stereos without interference from surrounding noise or the need to use high volume. Models are available for use with or without hearing aids. The family sets the volume of the TV, while the user adjusts only the volume of his or her listening system.

For help with the telephone, it is pretty well known that the phone company can provide instruments with volume controls. Also, the Hamilton Captel allows the user to read while listening to what is being said on the phone. This service is funded and regulated by the Federal Communications Commission – see www.fcc.gov.
