How can you meet these goals in the remaining six months of the year?

Honest answers to these questions, appropriate action in response to your answers and an energized positive approach will put you on the path to success.

It's also a sweet time of the year. To make your new year sweeter, I have three See's one-pound gift certificates waiting to be claimed. All you have to do receive a gift certificate is be one of the first three Lions from different clubs who email me requesting a certificate. Cabinet members, Lions who receive advanced copies of the Forum and prior winners (including family members) are not eligible.

VSP Certificates – I still have a number of VSP certificates for children and adults who qualify. If you have someone that needs an eye examination and eyeglasses but cannot afford it, we may be able to help <u>IF</u> they can meet <u>all</u> of the following criteria:

Patient's family income is at or under 200% of poverty level.

Patient doesn't have routine exam or materials coverage through Medicaid or other vision insurance.

Patient (or parent if patient is a child) is a U.S. citizen or documented resident with a SSN.

Patient has not used this program during the past 12 months. Lost, stolen or broken glasses won't be covered or replaced.

For a child's certificate, patient must be 18 years old or younger and hasn't graduated from high school.

In this forum we will continue on our talk about Leadership. But first I would like to tell you how it feels being on the other side of "We Serve".

All it took was support from Denise and a phone call from Jon Casteel stating I'll be over to you pick up for a float meeting and Ken Bell said can I give you a ride anywhere. And all the others Lions in the district that offered help and support to make me realize that service comes from within the hearts of our friends and family. The next time I help someone I will put myself in their place and try to feel what they are feeling. I am proud to be a Lion.

As we continue our talks about the course titled "How to be a leading lion" We reviewed in the last 4 forums several characteristics that are necessary for a leader to be successful and inspiring. Here are a few other characteristics.

A leader must be **Ethical.** An ethical leader inspires trust. They make decisions based on the good and welfare of the organization not a personal agenda. Members have confidence in this type of leader, knowing that the good of all members is being represented. Along with ethical a leader need to have Integrity. For people need to believe in their leaders. One also needs to be Caring and genuine in your feeling for the people that you lead. If the members know that you sincerely care about them and appreciate the time they put in to be a Lion, then they will respect you and follow you. You must also be Open Minded and be receptive to all ideas that you will receive. But you must also be Decisive. One needs to make a decision and stick to that decision. The key is to explain your decision to the other members and help them understand that the good of the organization has to take precedence over the concerns of the individual. Being decisive is Courageous. This is a characteristic that is greatly needed. It takes courage to make a decision that is unpopular but is needed for the survival and growth of the organization. Commitment, having the ability to commit to a course of action and convince others that the chosen course of action is correct for the organization. Having and demonstrating the power of your convictions. Empowering others to take up the flag and make the action a reality. Finally, a good leader needs to be a visionary. A leader must be capable of envisioning the way the organization should be. How do we increase our level of service? How do we keep our members satisfied? What can I do to help my members to see where we are going and help them get there?

- Lions Camp at Teresita Pines A non-profit organization that maintains and operates a camp near Wrightwood that provides group camping emphasizing the needs of the blind and disabled.
- Garden Grove Police Explorers Sponsored by the Garden Grove Police Department, the Garden Grove Police Explorer Post provides an opportunity for young men and women to experience firsthand how a police department functions and what it takes to get started with a challenging career in law enforcement.
- Garden Grove Boys & Girls Club The local Boys & Girls Club offers facilities and activities for young boys and girls to enable young people, especially those who need it most, to reach their full potential as productive, caring, responsible citizens.
- Kiwanisland A private park available for use by the local community at which children may picnic and camp for free, operated and maintained by the Kiwanis Club of Garden Grove.

In making the presentations, Lerma commented, "As you know, one of the best things about belonging to a service club like the Garden Grove Host Lions Club is paying it forward! That is giving away the funds our club worked so hard on raising throughout the year to those who are so deserving. HEARING & SPEECH ACTION NEWS

TIPS FOR HEARING PEOPLE ON COMMUNICATING WITH HARD OF HEARING PEOPLE

RULE: When audio is poor, emphasize the visual. Practice special speaking skills.

SET YOUR STAGE

- Face audience directly.
- Spotlight your face (no backlighting).
- Avoid noisy backgrounds.
- Get attention first.
- Ask how you can facilitate communication.

PROJECT YOUR COMMUNICATION

- Don't shout.
- Speak clearly, at moderate pace.
- Don't hide your mouth, chew food, gum, or smoke while talking.
- Re-phrase if you are not understood.
- Use facial expressions, gestures.
- Give clues when changing subject.

ESTABLISH EMPATHY WITH AUDIENCE

- Be patient if response seems slow.
- Stay positive and relaxed.
- Talk to a hard of hearing person, not about him/her.
- Offer respect to help build confidence.

TIPS FOR HARD OF HEARING PEOPLE ON COMMUNICATING WITH HEARING PEOPLE

RULE: Communication is a two-way street. Hard of hearing people must make as much effort as hearing people.

SET YOUR STAGE

- Tell others how best to talk to you.
- Pick your best spot (light, quiet, proximity).
- Anticipate difficult situations, plan how tominimize them.

PROJECT YOUR COMMUNICATION

- Pay attention.
- Concentrate on speaker.
- Look for visual cues.
- Ask for written cues if needed.
- Don't interrupt. Let conversation flow awhile to gain more meaning.

ESTABLISH EMPATHY WITH AUDIENCE

- React. Let speaker know how well he isdoing.
- Don't bluff. Admit it when you don't understand, to prevent trouble.
- If too tired to concentrate, ask for discussion later.


