What a District Meeting we Had!! On January 24th, about 120 Lions came together to learn, celebrate, have a good time and hear their Governor roasted. Our District meeting focused on Service, PDG Recognition and presentation of the Governor's Award of Excellence to individual Lions for their community service. Service – The featured speakers, the leadership academy, and the club projects display boards, all gave us the opportunity to share service project ideas that any club could potentially undertake. Carol Van Holt did an excellent job in positively encouraging clubs to display their service projects. Next District Meeting April 18th – Be sure mark it on your calendar. The featured events will include: Student Speaker Contest, Governor's Awards of Excellence for Leadership by a club member (excluding club presidents who will be recognized at the District convention), and a very interesting Leadership Academy presentation by PDG Howard Hudson on "Keep Your Club Legal - How to Stay in Compliance with Big Brother."

PDG Howard Hudson will give us an excellent presentation. He is a practicing CPA who knows the challenges, traps and problems unwary clubs can easily fall into with reporting and tax filing requirements. I strongly encourage every club to have their current and incoming president, secretary and treasurer attend. I cannot tell you the number of clubs who have had problems with tax returns not filed, suspension of clubs' ability to do business in California, failure to report charitable activities to the California Attorney General's Office, back interest and penalties, changes in raffle reporting requirements, etc.

Membership in the District continues to hover around 1,300, which is good given the time of year. Clubs who added new members in January included: Harbor Mesa, Newport Beach Hawaiian, OC Korean American, Pomona Host and Seal Beach - great work! HOT OFF THE PRESS – Seal Beach added 9 new members in February, which will bring them to 303 members. #2 in the U.S.

My thanks and compliments to GMT Coordinator Dave Hubbard for his fantastic job in getting the LCI campus clubs consultant into our District on short notice, organizing the training of 12 Lions to recruit for a campus club, making all the necessary contacts and coordinating all recruiting activities at our two target universities (Cal State Fullerton and Cal Poly Pomona), and actively participating in four days of recruiting activities on the two campuses. Cal State Fullerton will be sponsored by La Habra Host with Larry Rottweiler and Liz Steves as the Guiding Lions. Cal Poly Pomona will be sponsored by Pomona Host with Denny Mosier (a Cal Poly adjunct professor) and Gil Smith as the Guiding Lions.

New Member Orientations – Keep your eye out for the Region-wide orientations that GLT Coordinator Sheila Casteel will be promoting in the near future. Orientations can also be presented on a club level if there are a number of new members. Additionally, some clubs have requested a club wide orientation for all their members – especially where an orientation has not been conducted in a long time. PDG Dan Mayer and his entire Convention Committee have done an excellent job putting together a fun-filled convention. I greatly appreciate our 4-L4 Lions willingness to try some new approaches this year as we seek to make the District meetings more informative and valuable, and to recognize Lions who have excelled in club growth, service and leadership. 

District 4-L4 Meeting Saturday, January 24, 2015

District 4-L4 held its third Meeting of the year on Saturday, January 24. The theme for the day was Service, and the intent was to share useful ideas of high impact hands-on service projects, which can be used by any club, regardless of size. The presentations were organized around LCI's four areas of the Centennial Service Challenge: Sharing the Vision, Engaging our Youth, Relieving the Hunger and Protecting Our Environment.

The Leadership Academy, held before the meeting, showcased 14 projects from a variety of district clubs. Presenting in the area of Vision were Huntington Beach's Tom Hollister on Mobile Vision Screenings, Cucamonga District Host's PDG Norm MacKenzie on Techniques for Collecting Eye Glasses and Garden Grove's Chuck Lake on Eye Exams and Glasses for Low-Income Students. Speaking on Youth were Pomona Host's Jo Fulton on the "Little Free Library," Harbor Mesa's Carol Van Holt on the School Box Project, Diamond Bar Breakfast's Karen Eubanks on the Holiday Toy Drive and WendyAnn Stuard on Flag Days. Hunger projects were presented by La Habra Host's Liz Steves on Santa Cause and Harbor Mesa's Carol Van Holt on Second Harvest Food Bank. Environment speakers were Orange's Mike Smith on Basefield Field Renovation, Seal Beach's Scott Newton on Grafitti Removal and Cucamonga District Host's Jerry McJunkin on Tree Planting and Trail Clean-up. Also, two other projects were presented: Chapman University's President Alexis Morgan on Social Media in support of Lions service and Ontario Upland's Martha Hebert on miniature Christmas trees for residents of care facilities. IPDG/GLT Coordinator Sheila Casteel moderated the event. Clubs also put up project displays.

During the meeting, PDG Ken Sherwood led a humorous, yet serious Tribute to the Past District 4–L4 Governors. The Keynote Speech was delivered by four Lions on the Centennial Service Challenge. Seal Beach's Cathy Newton spoke on California Lions Friends in Sight, Cucamonga District Host's Steve Lacey on Reading Buddies, Pomona Host's WendyAnn Stuard on Feeding the Homeless and La Habra Host's President Liz Steves on 4th Saturday Lions in Action. 120 Lions attended the meeting, and 45 gathered for the Leadership Academy.



CANINE COMPANIONS FOR INDEPENDENCE UPDAGE

CCI is proud to report 2014 ended with a record placement of 289 teams. 2015 is off to a strong start. Two weeks ago the first class of service dogs completed training in conjunction with a Veterans Administration study to determine the benefit of dogs for veterans with PTSD. CCI is one of three organizations involved. The plan is to enroll 250 veterans for a 3 ½ to 4 year study. For two years beyond that, data will be collected and analyzed to determine if the partnerships have a therapeutic benefit.


Canine Companions is in the first stages of a capital campaign for the expansion of the North Central Regional Center in Ohio. An 11-acre flagpole shaped piece of property has been acquired in New Albany with the possibility of acquiring an additional 5-acre piece of property for \$250,000 that would turn the property into a rectangular shape. Presently architects are designing the new center. The new North Central Executive Director, Susan Lee Vick, and Paul Mundell will be interviewing firms this coming month to consult on a capital campaign. A letter of intent from the Seattle Community Foundation has been received for a \$2 million anonymous gift over a 6-year period for the center. This is phase one of an anticipated 3-year project.

Canine Companions is in partnership with Baylor Scott & White Health Center in the Dallas Texas area to develop a 6th Canine Companions training center. Construction is underway with completion scheduled for August. One team training class and graduation using dogs from the Southwest Center was conducted in one of their hospitals to build momentum and another is planned for March. One person has been hired and two program staff members from Oceanside have been identified for transfer to the center when it is completed. A \$2 million grant from a large foundation in the Dallas Texas area has been approved for that center. The land on which the 10 to 11 acre training center is being constructed is owned by the Town of Irving as part of the Irving Health Care District and is leased to Baylor in a perpetual lease. Baylor is paying all the capital construction and operational costs including staff salaries. Any CCI fundraising in Texas will be used to offset Baylor costs. Currently that area is part of the Southwest Region but will become a separate region called South Central. With the expansion at Baylor and North Central, the emphasis going forward is to increase the breeding program in order to graduate more teams each year to reduce the waiting list. Fortunately, there currently is a large supply of available volunteer puppy raisers.

A new whelping center developed on leased property at Northwest is expected to be operational by May. The intent is to reduce the burden of breeder/caretakers so more will volunteer, allowing more puppies to be produced each year.
