



If passed, non-paying members (students & others) will not have to pay district dues, but can participate as a cabinet officer, and could ultimately become District Governor. Cabinet officer positions are appointed. The Governor has complete control of assigning these positions. It seems highly unlikely that any student would have the time or finances to hold any district office,

If passed, non paying members (student & others) will add to the number of delegates a club gets, and this can affect elections.

We have 3 campus clubs with an average of 38 members. There are another 21 students in 3 Lions Clubs. These numbers are minimal as far as delegates are concerned. Again, with limited finances it seems doubtful that students will be able to attend a convention. This year we have one registered student delegate.

There is an excellent article Moving Forward on Membership The second question addresses "Why should I join Lions and have to pay dues, when I can volunteer anywhere I want free to charge?" and the last sentence is: We don't just need the numbers-we need the commitment and the hands to serve.

Yes, students can volunteer with many organizations and not pay dues. That is just the point. We want make it possible for them to volunteer as Lions, building a future where they will always be a part of the Lion's family. Finances are tight when in school. Campus Lions still have to come up with funds to run their clubs. Why put an extra burden on them to support the District. There is no expense to the District for a Campus Club.

This proposal has been rushed, without providing alternative options. If this proposal is stopped, our District could form a committee to evaluate the benefits and concerns regarding dues for student members, from campus & regular lions clubs, should be waived or reduced. We have already gone 5 years not charging, one more year will not hurt anything, but would give us time to look at all the facts.

When these clubs were formed they were told that they were required to pay a reduced rate of International Dues but no MD4 or 4-L4 dues. Whether we make this decision now or later, how can we tell these students that they now have to pay dues. Seems like this could be interpreted as a bait and switch. We would also have the potential of losing 120 members which would put us on status quo again with LC.

My understanding is that MD4 is also re-looking at their decision to waive the dues.

Here is the breakdown of other Districts:

- 2 have Campus Clubs but do not charge dues
- 2 working on Campus Clubs but will not be charging dues
- 1 has Campus Clubs but working on Bye-Laws change
- 2 have Campus Clubs and do charge dues
- 4 no Campus Clubs

More important it might encourage our District GMT - Global Membership Team, to make more effort to bring in regular clubs and members that pay dues and provide more retention help to our existing clubs. The future of this district depends on dues of contributing & dedicated members.

LCI has been aggressively promoting programs to encourage us to bring in younger Lions. Our future is highly dependent on introducing our organization to service —minded youth. Campus Clubs and student members are ways that LCI has suggested that we hook them young. Get the spirit in their blood where Lions will be a part of their future. Student members are potential leaders and professionals that we want to grab hold of early in life with the hope that they will continue on to become dues-paying Lions when they can afford to do so.

This proposal states that it is trying to conform the Bylaws to a practice that has been since 2011. I don't understand how we have had a <u>practice</u> since 2011 that conflicts with our Constitution and Bylaws . Lions Clubs International does have a Campus Lions Club Program. With submission of Student Member Certification Form, <u>LCI allows reduced charter fees and international dues</u>. Why do we want to eliminate all district dues for students, when LCI simply reduces their dues/fees? I see no information from LCI suggesting Districts reduce or eliminate dues for students. If MD4 delegates voted to eliminate dues paid by students, it doesn't mean the districts must do the same.

LCI reduces due to students. LCI is also the only part of the dues structure that has any related expenses, i.e. The Lion Magazine, promotion materials, paid employees, pins, etc. MD4 has no expense and will not manage dues collection for Districts. District 4-L4 has no expense. In addition, our budget is healthy. Most years we run in the black; last year by \$875, the year before by \$1850. We have 120 campus and student Lions which totals \$1860.00. There are many other issues that need to be addressed with our current budget. Changes can be made where any loss of revenue with student dues would be negligible. We are not a forprofit organization. We have the means to support our youth to secure the future of our organization.


