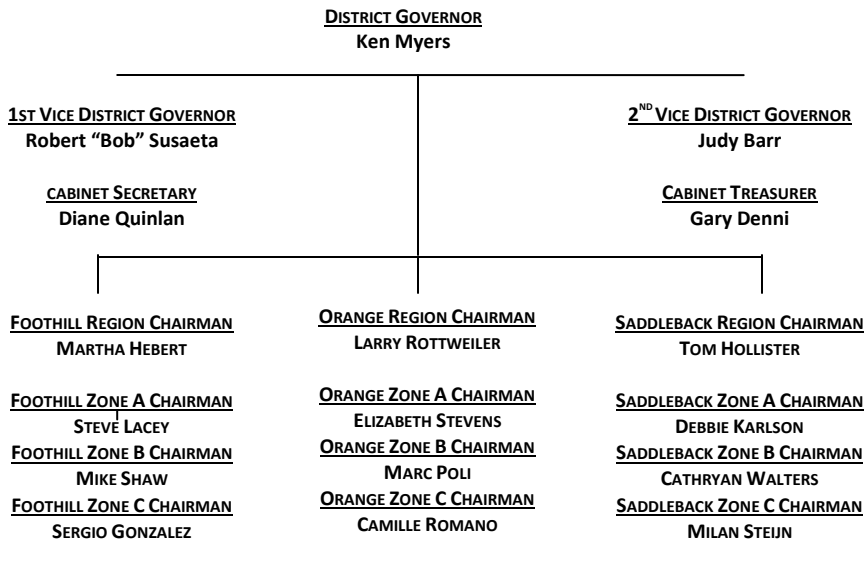

In Memoriam *Past District Governor Ken Sherwood*

Past District Governor Ken Sherwood was born in Los Angeles California. His family emigrated to Norwalk where he grew up, got his education and met his life partner of 55 years Marilyne. The Sherwoods moved to Pomona in 1970. There they raised their three children, Ken III, Kelly and Kevin. Thus began the seeds of community service with Cub

Scouts, Brownies and the Parent Teachers Guild at St. Madeleine's School. Ken and Marilyne are also blessed with their grandchildren, Haley, Grayson and Kody. A third generation printer, Ken took over ownership of the family reprographics business in 1984. From that business, Lion Ken published the District 4-L4 directory for 17 years.

Following in the "paw prints" of his father Ken Sr. and two uncles Bob and Omar Sherwood, Ken is a second generation Lion. He joined Pomona Host Lions in October 1982, giving him the opportunity to serve the blind in his own community, a project close to his heart since Marilyne's god parents were blind and taught him a lot about working with the sight-impaired. In 2000 he transferred to the Ontario-Upland Lions after serving as their Guiding Lion from 1999-2000.

Lion Ken served as President of the Pomona Host Lions in 1987-88 and continued to serve the district on the cabinet for 16 years in 18 offices becoming the inaugural 2nd Vice District Governor. In 2006-2008 he was president of the California International Pin Traders Association. He also served as a Lions Project for Canine Companions for Independence Trustee. He was dedicated to the Student Speakers Foundation serving as Trustee, on the board of directors and twice as Student Speakers Chairman. He served our District as Governor from 2011-2012.

He was awarded just about every accolade that Lions can get including: numerous club plaques and certificates for "outstanding service", 3 District Visitation Awards, Lion of the Year 1989 Pomona Host, Lion of the Year 2011 Ontario-Upland, Life member 2013 Ontario-Upland, 3 Abdul Awards, Guiding Lion Award, District 4-L4 Governor's Appreciation medal, Student Speaker Foundation "Benefactor", 10 Governor's Appreciation medals, 9 Int'l. President's Certificates of Appreciation, MD-4 Excellence Award 1999, Melvin Jones Fellowships 8 Progressive, 1st Believers Award from Int'l President Wing Kun Tam 2011, 2 MD-4 "California Eagle Awards", 3 Proud Lion Sponsor Awards, Senior Builder Key – He has sponsored 15 new members, which includes members in 3 different clubs. Most notably Lion Ken received the inaugural District Lifetime Achievement Award in 2015.

Lion Ken's sincerity of purpose was demonstrated by the years of collecting, cleaning, sorting, re-packaging and transporting approximately 100,000 pairs of used eye glasses & testing equipment. He considered his most rewarding service project to have been as driver for the Pomona Host Braille Bus program. For 22 years he picked up his blind friends at their homes once a week and drove them to the Braille Bus departure point in Pomona. After their Tuesday at Braille, Lion Ken picked them up and drove them back home, rain or shine; 44-47 trips per year with extra side trips to the grocery store on the way home, or time permitting, a stop for coffee on the way to the bus in the morning. Some weeks there was only 1 passenger and other times there were as many as 7 at once. They all became good friends, and racked up nearly 20,000 miles together over the years.

As health issues curtailed some of the activities he so loved, he continued mentoring and identifying new talent for future District Leadership. For all his dedication and hard work Lion Ken was honored as the first recipient of the District 4-L4 Lifetime Achievement Award give at the 2015 convention in Palm Spring.

Lion Ken left a legacy that was recognized by over 200 Lions at his memorial service. He was also honored by the Pomona City Council with a moment of silence at their October meeting. A letter of special thanks for his service was signed by all council members and sent to Lion Marilyn.

We will truly miss this special Lion, mentor to many, and friend to all.

With Fall upon us I'm reminded of one of my favorite annual presentations to my The La Habra Host Lions Club, "The Empty Chair Ceremony." I asked Member Lion Chuck Morse to summarize his presentation in words to share with District 4L4.

"We as American's are ever mindful that our enduring peace has always been tainted by the bitterness of personal sacrifice. We are compelled to never forget that while we enjoy our daily pleasures, there are others who have endured and may continue to endure agonies of pain, deprivation and interment. Today there are a total of over 83,432 POW/MIA's on foreign soil including all wars and recent conflicts. Over 71,000 are still listed from WWII.

In a tribute to these military POW/MIA's an annual presentation was orchestrated several years ago known as "The Empty Chair Ceremony" It consists of a display symbolizing the fact that members of our armed forces are still missing. They are unable to be with their loved ones and families, so we pay tribute with a display and the following poem...

"The Table is round symbolizing the frailty of one lone prisoner, alone against his or her oppressors.

The Tablecloth is white, symbolizing the purity of their intentions to respond to their Country's call to arms.

The Glass is inverted; they cannot toast with us this day.

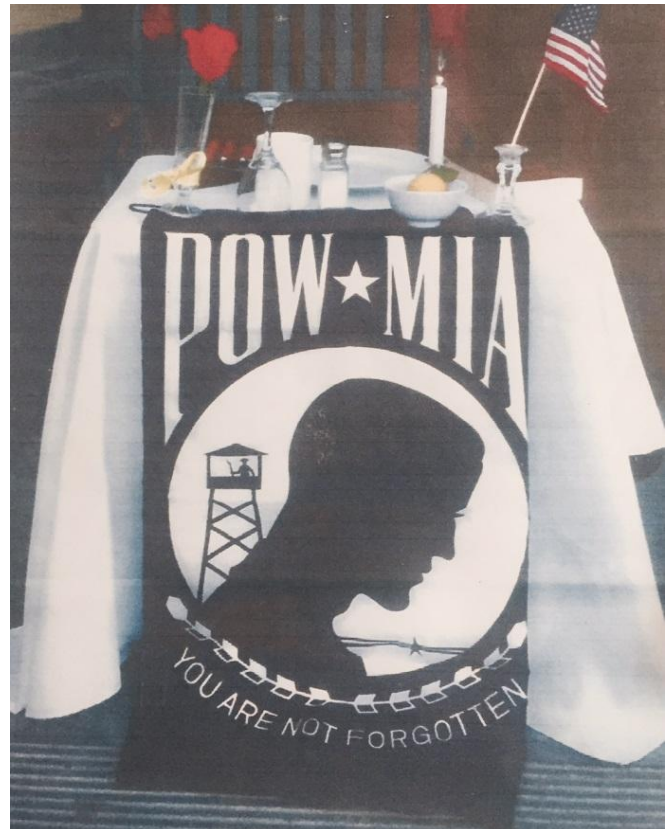

This was the 15th year of this Harbor Mesa Lion's project. All the necessary materials were purchased ahead of time watching for sales at local stores.

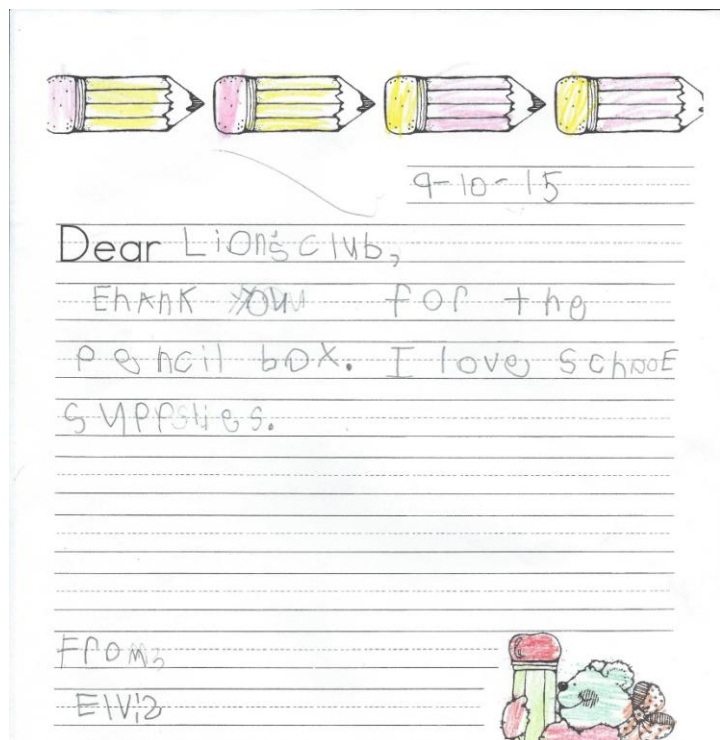

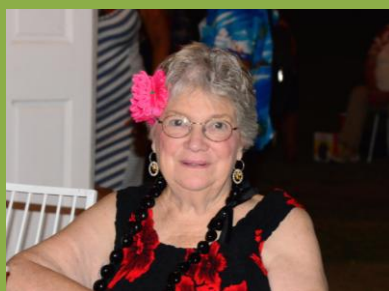
In a show of respect over 50 of his Cubs came to the meeting for this special tribute. A great short film was put together highlighting all he has done for the club and the community.

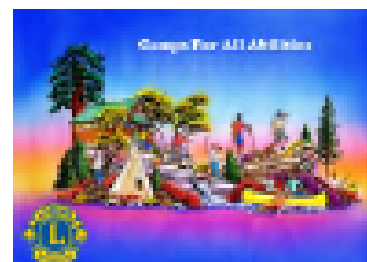

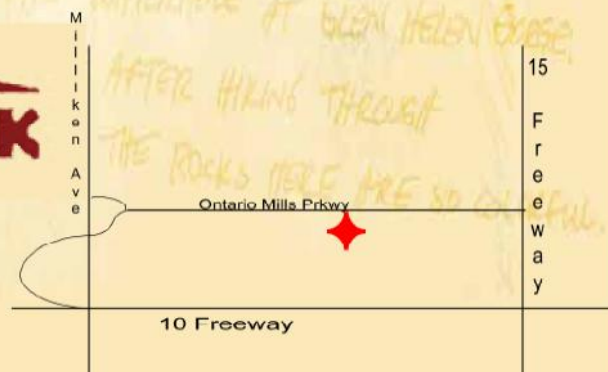
