

At least eight clubs have completed all four areas, Vision, Hunger, Youth, and Environment, and there are several clubs who have two or three projects completed and documented on the My LCI website. With about six months to go, I really hope that each club will work hard to complete the challenge and earn a centennial patch!

Now let's talk about a commitment to build a Centennial Legacy. Now is a good time to connect with your community by planning a lasting project. Legacy projects are visible gifts to your community that commemorate our Lions centennial and create a lasting legacy of your service contributions.

I know you are asking yourselves, "what project could we possibly do?" I have one suggestion, and I guarantee that you could probably think of many more. I'd like to suggest to you a living memorial of an Elm tree. This hardy elm is delivered as a six foot tall American Liberty Elm, ready for planting. It includes a bronze plaque secured in a 75 pound block of granite. It would state in your words your dedication and commitment to our world. It also includes the Lions logo and your clubs name.

This unique memorial will grow nearly 100 feet tall and lives about 100 years. What better way to celebrate our 100 year centennial? This is also great PR for your club. Once planted, hold a dedication ceremony and invite the media, city council, residents, and club members from the district. Next report the legacy project to the LCI Activity report. You will earn a special banner patch and certain select projects will be featured on the LCI website and magazine.

I have all of the details on how to start this project. Best of all, the cost is minimal. For less than \$500, your club will be the proud sponsor of a living memorial. Huntington Beach Host planted a tree last June at Fountain Valley High School. Tustin Host is planting one on February 27 at the Blind Children's Learning Center. In 2014, I was admitted as a general board member and was responsible for organizing and leading events. For example, I collected eyeglasses so that they could be recycled for those in need in developing countries. I also assisted disadvantaged hospital patients by volunteering in the Ronald McDonald House. I recall my favorite moment was baking food and preparing goods with other volunteers for the patients; it gave me a great profound respect for organizations, like Ronald McDonald and Leo Club, which work together to benefit members of the community.

Later, I advocated members to attend Special Need Dances in order to raise awareness of those with disabilities. I love dancing with special needs children, because their spirits are uplifted and there is so much positive energy during this event. I also helped raise publicity of Leo Club by selling cotton candy at a fair. During the holiday season, I volunteered at the We Give Thanks event, where volunteers and I prepared Thanksgiving meals for the homeless people of our community.

Subject: Call for Nominations

Dear Club Presidents,

This is the Official Call for Nominations/Notification of Election of Officers. The following is an outline for the qualifications for Second Vice District Governor as noted in Article III, Section 2 of the Bylaws of Lions Clubs District 4-L4, Lions Clubs International.

"Section 2. VICE DISTRICT GOVERNORS. A candidate for the office of 1st and 2nd vice district governors shall:

- (a) Be an active member in good standing in a chartered Lions Club in good standing in the district.
- (b) Secure the endorsement of his/her club ar a majority of the clubs in the district. Announcement of candidacy shall be by letter signed by his/her club President and sent to all members of the Nominations, Credentials and Elections Committee and to each club in the district prior to March 15. In the event of endorsement by a majority of the clubs in the district, the cabinet secretary/treasurer (or, if appointed by the district governor, the cabinet secretary) will forward such information to each member of the Nominations Credentials and Elections Committee and to each club in the district.
- (c) Have served as president of a Lions Club for a full term or major portion thereof and a member of the Board of Directors of a Lions Club for no less than two (2) additional years; and as zone Chairman or region Chairman or cabinet secretary and/or treasurer for a full term or major portion thereof. None of the above may be accomplished concurrently.
- (d) Only in the event there is no candidate for the offices of vice district governors at the time of the district Convention, any club member who fulfills all requirements of this section may stand for election.
- (e) Candidates for the offices of both vice district governors may not begin active campaigning prior to February 1 for the year his/her candidacy is announced."

<u>ONTARIO UPLAND LIONS</u> members were busy collecting clothes for the homeless at Tent City in Ontario, socks and underwear at New Hope, and shopping for our adopted family in hope of making their holiday a little brighter. Two members kept their fingers busy in December and January knitting liners for the military helmets and baby hats for the newborns in the hospital.

There was a member who volunteered in the snack bar at the local Grove Theater in Upland. The Grove introduced the youth to the art of acting, by giving several musicals throughout the year. Some of our members shopped and designed centerpieces for International President reception in Rosemead before the Rose Parade in Pasadena. A few of our Lions took time our of their day to visit the shut-ins, volunteer at their local churches, collect donations in their community for the Leukemia and Lung Foundations. Two members gave time at the Montclair Community Center for the Food Distributions to 236 low income residents of Montclair. On December 9, 2015 and January 27, 2016 a lion was at the Montclair Senior Center helping decorate the tables for 200 guest at the monthly Birthday Celebration, and selling lunch tickets for the next month's party. The club's Student Speaker's Competition was held on January 27, 2016, so members were busy with schools and students in preparation for the competition. Excellent speakers. Plastic bags, cans, pull tabs, and papers were collected and sorted for recycling. The bags are made into plastic yarn (plam) which is used to crochet mats for the homeless.

<u>UPLAND HOST LIONS</u> have scheduled their Student Speaker Competition on February 15, 2016 at the CAF building at the entrance to Cable Airport. The contest starts promptly at 6:30 pm so attendees should arrive no later than 6:15 pm. Lion Martha Hebert, Foothill Region Chair attended the board meeting on January 4, 2016 and presented congratulatory letters and Chevrons from International President commending two members for their length of service. Congratulations Lion Bert for 20 years of membership and Lion Mike for 10 years of membership and for your longevity service to Lions and your club. Another guest, Lion Jerry McJunkin, requested assistance in putting together packets of toiletries. Those volunteering to help will meet at 6:00 pm, January 5th at Magnolia Park. Lion Madeleine volunteered to bring 2 suitcases of toiletries to donate.

ONTARIO HOST LIONS have their Student Speaker Competition scheduled for Tuesday, February 2, 2016. It will beheld at San Joaquin Valley College at 12 noon.

POMONA HOST LIONS had two club members drive to La Habra to pick up discarded books and transported them home. Another lion help clean and sort the book determining which to keep and which to toss. The good books will be placed in the Little Free Library around the community. Two members delivered boxes of books in a truck and a car to the storage area provided by the teachers union. The number of people served is being divided among the various multi-day steps of the project so they are not counted twice. As part of the LCI RAP partnership with Macy's, the Pomona Host Lions distribute free books to first graders at schools with poverty rates (Federal Free and Reduced Lunch criteria of 95% and above. Thursday night and Friday morning, three Lions reviewed the book catalog and then ordered 500 books. Another Lion transported 40 additional stored books and helped with the planning. On January 1, 2016, Pomona Host continued it winter focus on feeding the homeless men and women of Pomona. Five Lions prepared and served dinner to 100 homeless at the Pomona Armory. Again on January 25, twenty PH Lions bought food supplies, prepared and served dinner to 125 homeless people in the winter shelter at the Pomona Armory.

<u>Chino Valley Lions</u> welcomed a new member to their club, Allyson Agee. Congratulations! The club purchased 5 pairs of glassed for school children who's parents could not afford to purchased them. One member along with 11 Boy Scouts from Troop 220 helped with roadside cleanup. They picked up 5 bags in 2 hours. Great job. Twice a week one member picks up excess food from a supermarket and takes it to the local food bank where they give it out to the hungry.

<u>Diamond Bar Breakfast Lions</u> started out the new year by having eighteen members participating in the Snow Fest in the City of Diamond Bar. One lion volunteered at Our Lady of the Assumption Church of Claremont. One lion volunteered at the Boys and Girls Club of Pomona Valley. 


