A Message from 1st Vice District Governor Bob Susaeta



Subject: Call for Nominations

Dear Club Presidents,

This is the Official Call for Nominations/Notification of Election of Officers. The following is an outline for the qualifications for Second Vice District Governor as noted in Article III, Section 2 of the Bylaws of Lions Clubs District 4-L4, Lions Clubs International.

"Section 2. VICE DISTRICT GOVERNORS. A candidate for the office of 1st and 2nd vice district governors shall:

- (a) Be an active member in good standing in a chartered Lions Club in good standing in the district.
- (b) Secure the endorsement of his/her club ar a majority of the clubs in the district. Announcement of candidacy shall be by letter signed by his/her club President and sent to all members of the Nominations, Credentials and Elections Committee and to each club in the district prior to March 15. In the event of endorsement by a majority of the clubs in the district, the cabinet secretary/treasurer (or, if appointed by the district governor, the cabinet secretary) will forward such information to each member of the Nominations Credentials and Elections Committee and to each club in the district.
- (c) Have served as president of a Lions Club for a full term or major portion thereof and a member of the Board of Directors of a Lions Club for no less than two (2) additional years; and as zone Chairman or region Chairman or cabinet secretary and/or treasurer for a full term or major portion thereof. None of the above may be accomplished concurrently.
- (d) Only in the event there is no candidate for the offices of vice district governors at the time of the district Convention, any club member who fulfills all requirements of this section may stand for election.
- (e) Candidates for the offices of both vice district governors may not begin active campaigning prior to February 1 for the year his/her candidacy is announced."

The Brea Lions Club collected a ton of pajamas that were donated to the Crittenton Services for Children and Families Non-Profit Organization in Fullerton.

This is a "Level 12" residential treatment center with a high level of staffing operating 24 hours a day / 7 days a week providing comprehensive counseling, medical, and other support services for the clients in their care. In addition, they also have a continuum of care programming effort for clients that are in need of a holistic approach that addresses the treatment of childhood trauma in a culturally sensitive, gender-responsive, and trauma-informed care environment.



Crittenton is a fully licensed and nationally accredited agency established and incorporated in 1966, committed to provide expertise and assistance to the clients and community partners. Crittenton provides a full array of residential treatment, group home aftercare, on-site educational opportunities, parent and child education programming, substance abuse treatment, independent living services, transitional age youth programming, community based programs, in-home therapy services, wraparound family services, family preservation programming, foster care programming, mental health programming with a specialization of children's and adolescent mental health needs, and specialized treatment for commercial sexually exploited children known as Crittenton's InSight Program.

Several members, again this year, met at Lion Teresa home and decorated seventeen small Christmas Trees that were donated to Plott Nursing Home. These small trees mean so much to the patients that are in the nursing home. Again this year the club adopted a family that needed help with the Holidays. This was a family of six and the father is in the military and suffers from PSTD. The members along other family members and friends were so generous with their giving of gifts for each family member and food items.

<u>UPLAND HOST LIONS</u> celebrated the season with a Christmas Progressive Dinner. Three members volunteered their homes for the evening of various courses. Lion Madeleine prepared appetizers to start the evening, President Jim provided a delicious main course and Gov. Ken ended the fun evening with delicious desserts and opening of white elephant gifts. Everyone enjoyed the exciting evening.

ZONE B Chair Mike Shaw

ONTARIO HOST LIONS held their annual Christmas food give away to the needy. Families were identified with the assistance of the Ontario-Montclair School District. This year the event served 197 families with the assistance of 15 Lions, 10 Leos, several San Joaquin Valley College branch club members and numerous community volunteers donating canned goods and other food items as well as an abundant of perishable items purchased by OH Lions, which were sorted and picked up or delivered to the selective families. Each family received three large boxes of nutritious food. In addition to distributing the food, the children of these families were invited to meet Santa (Lion Jim Garbo) at which time over 200 children were able to select an unwrapped toy of their choice. It was said that this program could not be the success it has become without coordination and leadership of Dave Flatten. Dave has provided the space at his business (Inland Powder Coating) for the event and his employees manpower and equipment to assist in making this one of the most well received event in over 30 years history of OH Lions. At the Upland Parade, several LEOs dressed as elves and passed out candy to children along the parade route.

POMONA HOST's toy drive for disadvantaged children on December 3rd marked the last day of their annual toy collection for Santa Cop Party. Forty children identified as impoverished by the Pomona School District are invited to the party where they get to pick out a gift. PH Lions held a toy collection at the city's Christmas Band Concert. Community members were asked to bring toys to the concert. Assisted by Santa and other Lions took the toys to the Police Department for Santa Cops to distribute to impoverished children. The PUSD provided a list of 200 children to receive the toys. Eight PH Lions and five LEOs ran the Feeding the Homeless Project by purchasing the food, cooking and serving approximately 150 residents who sleep on cots at the Pomona Armory every night. The LEOs delivered meals to those who could not walk down the stairs to the basement and made box meals for the late comers. Magazines and decks of cards were taken to the shelter, since residents have little to do during the late afternoons and evenings hours other than sit and lie aimlessly on the cots. They are in the process of building a library of used books for them. Also, two coats were donated and they are in the process of collecting more coats. This act of kindness was repeated on 12/21/15 when more magazines and cards were taken. Donor certificates were given to those who paid \$50.00 to purchase a pair of glasses for Pomona students whose families have no insurance nor can afford to purchase them. PH Lions are committed to helping children do their best in school so they can have success in the future. Zone B Chair Mike Shaw attended a meeting to present PDG Gil Smith and Kevin Maloney with their 20-years in Lions chevron.

<u>WESTERN U</u> has been busy with final exams, but found time for one event. They set up and ran a vision screening section at the Pomona Community Health Action Team (PCHAT) health fair in The Village at Indian Hill. They served approximately 20 patients. Lions volunteering the time were Kim Loi Vo, Matthew Olson, Sarah Hoffey, Sabrina Cardell, and Angelica Rayo.

CHINO VALLEY LIONS had two members volunteering eleven hours decorating the Lions' Float for the Tournament of Roses Parade.

Twelve members raised funds for the "Toys for Tots" toy drive. Lion Carole McCleary provided knitted hats for newborn babies at Pomona Valley Hospital. The hats are given to the newborns when they are taken home. In 2015, Carole spent 1360 hours knitting 340 hats. She has been doing this service for the hospital for five year. Great job Carole McCleary, thanks for your valuable service.

The CV Lions made collections from selected supermarkets for excess food and cut flowers that cannot be sold to consumers, but can be utilized by local food banks, that benefited fifty-two individuals. CV Lions provided soft serve ice cream for the City of Chino Christmas Parade and Fair, a community event. A fundraiser was held at Tahoe Joe Restaurant serving sixty-six people. The funds raised will used to further help the community. The Boy Scouts Troop spent two separate days cleaning up the highways of litter, which is a part of Adopt a Highway.

<u>DIAMOND BAR BREAKFAST LIONS</u> held a toy drive to collect toys for The Sparke of Love. There were three Lions to collect enough toys to serve 100 children. One Lion spent 4 hours decorating the Lions Float for the Tournament of Roses Parade that was views by more that 70,000 viewers on January 1, 2016.


