

Greetings Lions! I want to start off this month's article by saying Thank you! You have been listening and paying attention. Your club membership numbers are increasing. At nearly all of the Governor's visitations the past few months, DG Bob has inducted new members. Since this is the month of Thanksgiving, I wanted to say Thank You for making that happen! My previous two articles discussed Step 1, Preparing Your Club to Gain New Members, and Step

2, Creating Your Club's Growth Plan. November is time for Step 3, Implement Your Growth Plan. Now is the time to reach out to the community. This is "recruiting." Your goal is to recruit new people to join. First question to ask someone? "Has anyone asked you to join the Lions Club?" If the answer is "no," ask them if they are interested giving back to or serving the community in some way. Then talk to them about your club and its service. Next invite them to one of your service projects or a club meeting. Make sure you get their phone number and email so that you can follow up and confirm that they will attend. Sometimes a gentle reminder makes them feel special and wanted. Ask the attendee what they are passionate about. Would they be interested in working on a project of their choice? Remember, too, that their time is important. Your meeting should start on time and you should follow an agenda. Afterwards, ask them if they have any questions and then give them an application. Membership to join Lions is by invitation. Make sure they are a good fit and make sure they have met everyone else in attendance. Lastly, keep in touch. Show them that you care. Also, ask them if they have any friends or family members that would be interested in becoming a Lion. They won't feel so new and unsure if surrounded by new friends and old friends. So let's keep on thanking our fellow Lions for asking people to join. Strength in numbers makes projects so much simpler. Thank you for being a Lion! I'm certainly proud to be a member of the world's largest service organization! How about you? Happy Thanksgiving!

Examples of Centennial Service Challenge Activities/Projects are:

<u>Engaging our Youth</u>: Invite Leos and youth in your area to help organize and participate in a service project. Projects may include school or community facility cleanups or a visit to a home for senior citizens or a children's hospital. Allowing youth to develop and lead a service project enables them to learn skills while emphasizing the role of service.

<u>Sharing the Vision</u>: Plan vision health projects and work with the visually impaired. Many Lions already celebrate World Sight Day in October. This is a great month to organize a vision screening, volunteer at a nearby Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center, organize an eyeglass collection or an activity to benefit the visually impaired in your community.

Relieving the Hunger: Organize food drives and projects to feed the hungry. With the downturn in the global economy, many hunger relief organizations are finding it difficult to keep up with demand. Help alleviate hunger by planning events around the end and beginning of the calendar year to collect and distribute food.

<u>Protecting our Environment:</u> Implement projects that improve and protect the environment. Organize a highway clean up, plant trees or plan a community "Earth Day" event to collect recyclables such as aluminum cans, plastic bottles, used cell phones and batteries.

Please make sure that you are reporting all eye glasses collected as we are not seeing that many clubs yet this year. To report this, the activity type is under Health and Wellness, click on Eyeglasses Collected. Be sure to fill in the number of glasses collected in the box not in the description. I first arrived in Japan on July 2, 2016 and from that day began an experience that I will never forget. I met my host family, Mr. and Mrs. Miura, and their dog Momo on July 3rd. I was greeted by my host family and the host lions club in Hirosaki. For the first few days in Hirosaki, I did a lot of sightseeing and visited big sites such as Mt. Iwaki, Hirosaki Castle and Lake Ogawara. On my eighth and ninth day in Hirosaki I visited a Japanese high school, Seiai High School. I especially enjoyed visiting the high school and seeing how it differed from school in America. Along with visiting a high school, my host family planned for the three of us to go to Hakodate, the city where my host mother grew up. Hakodate was also interesting to see how it compared to Hirosaki. Both cities were fascinating to see how close the metropolitan and rural parts of the city were to each other. After returning from Hakodate, I visited several night markets where I tried several street foods, takoyaki being my favorite. After 26 days in Hirosaki, I left my host family to go to Akita City where I would attend a youth exchange camp. At the camp there were four other kids from other places in the world attending the same camp. I had an amazing time staying with the other kids my age and still talk to them till this day. I wouldn't trade my experience in Japan for anything else.





SO YOU ARE THINKING OF HOSTING A YEP STUDENT? - BY LION MARTHA HEBERT

I had heard of the Youth Exchange Program since becoming a Lion in 1996, but never dreamed I would ever be a part of such a wonderful program. I really didn't think that I could afford to host a student, even though I wanted to. One year my friend, PDG Judy Schnitzer talked to me about getting involved with the Youth Exchange Program. Judy invited me to some of the activities so I could meet the students. I was hooked. Judy was asked to run for Vice District Governor so Judy asked me to be Chairperson for 4-L4's YEP. How could I tell my friend "no?" I wanted her to eventually become Governor. This started as a trial year for me. I soon learned that I could do the job plus host a student. The toughest thing was stretching the budget to give the students a cultural exchange they deserved. My committee worked as a team to plan the activities that could be done free or minimal charge. It worked. We planned visits to San Diego (Zoo, I-Max, Wild Animal Park, museums, shopping and beach party) while we had a slumber party at Lion friend Manny DeMetris from 4-L6. Manny and members of his club donated tickets. Topped off by our host preparing breakfast each morning and his Lions Club preparing dinner (sort of a meet and greet time). Through friends of friends, we were able to gets cabins in the mountains at no cost or for a very minimal charge. We prepared most of our meals, breakfast and dinner and sometimes took picnic lunches on our all day adventures (such as boat trips around the lake, with the help of PDGs Bob and Mel Niez from 4-L6). One year, Lion George Schnitzer, by the way of great research on the computer, found the Newport Aquatic Club where kayaking, canoeing, stand-up paddle boarding was taught. He was going to talk with them about getting the students involved. Lion Susan Seager told us that she lived near the club and could talk to them. It turned out that Susan knew the owner as he had gone to school with her daughters. Because of Lions George and Susan the owner offered to give the students lessons free and has done so ever since. By us in 4-L4 working as a team the students have experienced many different cultural exchanges. Thanks to everyone I worked with for helping make those two weeks and now ten days an exciting experience for everyone involved.

If hosting is something you would like to do. Go for it. They can be like family even in the short time they are visiting in your home. Plus, it is nice to continue to hear from them even years after their visit.

Thanks to Lion Diane Quinlan for being chairperson now. She is doing a fabulous job and I still enjoy being a part of this youth program.

MY EXPERIENCE WITH YEP - BY PDG JUDY SCHNITZER

My involvement with the Lions Youth Exchange Program began in 2006 when I became the Chairman of the District Program. Lion George and I and family had hosted a number of foreign exchange students through the years and since it had enriched our lives and we loved every minute of it, I felt this would be really something our family would enjoy doing again and so began our Lions hosting adventures.

What adventures we've had during these last 10 years. Wanting to learn the various cultures of the world, we have chosen students from The Netherlands, Belgium, Denmark, Finland, Austria, Israel Germany and Italy. Each of them were remarkable young men and women and each of them had different talents. For instance, one founded an integration project called "Crossing the Bridge" for which she received a Federal Integration Prize (Country of Germany), another spoke four languages, was very artistic and her family owned the "First Tyrolean Wood Museum" (Country of Austria) and another trained horses and had an optimistic attitude to life (Country of Finland). Our students from Denmark and The Netherlands were into music and were both singers—the one from Denmark wrote a song which made it to the finals in a Danish songwriting contest and the young lady from The Netherlands was in a cover band when she was fifteen and now sings in a jazz band called "Black Coffee", is on YouTube and writes her own songs as well. Our young lady from Belgium was very athletic and is studying to be a doctor. The young man we had from Italy ten years ago is now living in Milan and working 10-12 hours a day at an audit firm and just recently sent us his favorite wine which he says is very rare and hard to find by way of our friends who visited Italy this past summer. Some of the memorable times while hosting were our trips to San Diego, Big Bear, Palm Springs and Hollywood. For several years, we traveled to San Diego where we stayed with a 4-L6 Lions Club member who hosted all of us in his home. It was wall to wall people in his home but he didn't care, he enjoyed us coming down to see him each summer. He was quite a cook and always prepared great meals for all of us which included breakfast, lunch and dinner and he always invited some of his Lions Club members to join us for the bar-be-ques. Also, for several years, we traveled to Big Bear where we rented a cabin and were able to show the students what California mountain living was like. One of the highlights was taking a boat excursion down Big Bear Lake with a 4-L5 Lions Club member at the helm and narrating the excursion. We've also traveled to Palm Springs so that the students could experience the desert for a week-end. They couldn't believe all of the palm trees and cactus they saw, and it was always fun having us host families joining in on the week-end fun. Of course there was Hollywood, everyone wanted to see that tourist attraction! After a few times of driving there and fighting the traffic, Lion George came up with the idea of taking the train and boy was that a smart idea. Now we can sit back, relax and enjoy the trip! Just seeing the Hollywood sign, the stars on the Hollywood Walk of Fame, the hand and foot prints and the Wax Museum was so exciting for the students. Also memorable were our adventures to Newport Aquatic Center where we could all enjoy kayaking/stand up paddle boarding—they got a kick out of us host family members falling into the water while learning how to paddle board, etc.

Hosting a foreign exchange student certainly has been a rewarding adventure. Nothing is better than providing today's youth, our leaders of tomorrow, an opportunity to learn about people and countries other than their own in an effort to promote world peace. We may have them only for 10 days, but theirs and our memories will last a lifetime.

DISTRICT LEO UPDATE - DISTRICT LEO PRESIDENT MADISON BERRY

Hello Lions! I hope your November is going well and you are all excited for the upcoming holidays and all the extra events and service opportunities that are rapidly approaching. Even when your schedule gets crazy, I hope you all remember the reason we do what we do and the immense impact we can make on those around us.

Before I go any further, allow me to introduce myself to you. My name is Madison Berry and I am the District Leo President for 2016-2017 as well as your 2015-2016 Leo of the Year. I joined the Village Bible Academy Leo Club during my freshman year and I am currently on my second term as President. During my three years as a Leo, I have had the privilege to learn and grow while serving my community. The experience I have gained from Leos is something I want to share with every youth ready to give his or her time to serve.


FOOTHILL ZONE B CHAIR MICHAEL SHAW

The <u>Ontario-Host Lions</u> continues to help these veterans and other veteran groups in the area. We were also able to attach a plaque to a rock placed next to the tree our members planted for the students at Lincoln Elementary School in Ontario which will qualify for our Centennial Legacy project. On Wednesday, October 18th, Lion Michael Shaw joined in on the camera vision training at Upland Head Start Preschool. He is excited about the program and said it was truly an eye-opening experience. They were able to see about sixty preschoolers and it was amazing how easy it was to screen each child with this new system. Six of the preschoolers screened were referred for a variety of vision problems. It was an amazing morning and we would like to see this program in our District. Saturday, October 22nd, Lion Michael Shaw received a certificate of achievement when he finished his training as a Guiding Lion. Our club also continued with PCC Ed Bordenkircher's "student of the month" program honoring five students that were recognized by their teachers. We've added two new members to the <u>Ontario-Host</u> bringing along life experiences and fresh ideas. Finally, our club members turned in their environmental photos and one was chosen to represent our club at the district level photo contest.









The <u>Pomona Host Lions Club</u> has been busy serving the community during the month of October. In vision service, the club continued to provide eyeglasses for needy students at the Pomona Lions Vision and Hearing Center, collected used eyeglasses, had a presentation on Lions KidSight and held several strategic planning sessions with the school district on how to best meet the vision needs of the children. The club is also making a major purchase of a manual phoropter (vision testing machine with lots of lens—"Which is better, one or two?") to replace the broken one in the vision center.

The club remains committed to increasing the literacy skills of school children. Momentum is building for the kick-off of the Lions Roar for Reading book distributions to first graders from the nine schools with over 95% poverty rates. The club held a dine out night at Corky's to raise money for it, and nine members went to the city council meeting, where they explained the Lions Roar for Reading program and thanked the City Council Members for their donation toward the purchase of books. At Pomona Reads, a large group of Lions took turns reading at the club's four story-reading stations, and then some of the children read to the Lions. Throughout the month, Little Free Library stewards kept the libraries well-stocked, and club members made several pick-ups of donated books. Thanks to the district Lions who are donating books! We greatly appreciate these because large areas of Pomona are "book deserts," where many residents don't own books to exhange for the ones they take. That is okay because it gets people reading.





Our club's most earth-shaking news (couldn't resist the pun, sorry) is that award-winning earthquake preparedness expert Lion Steve Storbakken, who was on the original team that created the ShakeOut, presented an earthquake and preparedness update, then conducted an under-the-table "Duck, Cover and Hold On" drill. The <u>Pomona Host Lions</u> have conducted these drills yearly since the first ShakeOut in 2008. For the thirteenth consecutive year, the club gave mini-grants for enhancing classroom instruction to Pomona Unified teachers, this time to eighteen. Finally, at the very end of the month, we held our Bowl-a-thon, known this year as the "Booa-thon" because of its Halloween theme. We had a ton of fun, dressed in our Halloween costumes and bowling.

Western U Lions Club participated in working with Dr. Susan Tran and the Monterey Park Lions Club. Dr. Tran and four second year Optometry students screened over 400 children at two different elementary schools in Monterey Park. Some upcoming events Western U Lions Club are participating in are: 10/29 - AOJAH Health Fair 25, Western U Lions Club members will be working with Dr. Cheng to provide free vision screenings and glasses to the homeless and impoverished in LA; 11/6 - Vietnamese Community Health Fair, 20 Western U Lions Club members will provide free vision screenings to those in the Vietnamese community who may not afford eye care; 12/3 - Anaheim Health Fair, Lion Ken Myers emailed me to recruit volunteers for this event.






