Can you believe that the first quarter is now history? It has been a great one and I would like to thank all of you for making it a success. I hope that we can continue this momentum for the rest of the year. Let me share the first quarter results from LCI. In the United States new club charters have increased by over 250% as compared to 2015. Negative membership growth trends were reduced by 39.6%. We saw a growth in the USA of over 400 members in the past 30 days.

Now let's talk about our District. We started the year with 1,230 members and we are now at 1,304 with a net gain of 74. Each and every club is adding new members. In September we attended the Charter Night of the Orange County Hana Club. They chartered with thirty members and as of now they are at forty five. We are looking to charter more new clubs in the next several months. Again I congratulate all of you for embracing my motto for the year, "Joining Hands In Service." This continues to grow with each and every month and is making a big difference with the people we are serving.

We just completed our three Region Meetings which were all very successful with great attendance. Lion Joan Parks, President of the Sight and Hearing Foundation, with the assistance of IPDG Ken Myers gave hands-on demonstrations of the spot cameras with a very good response from all in attendance. I hope that you will all attend our second District Meeting on November 19th in Diamond Bar. This is where we honor our vets and we will have guest speakers from the Wounded Warriors. We will also have a session on Leadership presented by PDG Ken Ibarra from the MD4 Global Leadership Team. This will begin prior to the actual District Meeting. Check your emails for the actual flyer and times.

The Centennial Convention in Chicago will be here before you know it and we are expecting a great turn out. I would suggest that you make your reservations very soon. The California Delegation Hotel is the Palmer House and it will sell out pretty fast. Again thanks to all of you for making this a successful first quarter and lets all work together to continue this for the rest of the year. Remember "It's not our job to fix people. Our job is simply to be there for them."



As reported last month, <u>Cucamonga District Host (CDH) Lions Club</u> was the lead for the multi-club vision screening sponsored by California Lions Friends in Sight (CLFIS) on September 10th. I would like to report in this issue the successful outcome of that screening. Local Lions clubs banded together for community as <u>CDH Lions Club</u>, along with the <u>Ontario-Upland Lions Club</u>, <u>Upland Host Lions Club</u> and Zone B's <u>Ontario Host Lions Club</u>, screened over 374 people! That's about 100 more than we saw last year at our Rancho location, so the move to Ontario was a huge success. In addition, we distributed 360 pairs of glasses and referred 98 individuals to doctors for more serious testing. The local doctors who volunteered their time were <u>Jon M. Henley, Richard A. Gilkison</u> and <u>Brian Van Dusen</u>. The <u>San Joaquin Valley College</u> sent over 20 volunteers. <u>Chik-fil-A</u> in Upland generously provided breakfast and lunch for all the volunteers.

September was a very exciting and fulfilling month for our **Ontario Host Lions** Club. On September 7th our club officially became ninety-five years old! This event was publicized in the 1922 newspaper from Ontario, The Daily Report. The front page of the newspaper went on to say, "the roster of this new Lions Club is rich in leading names of the community." These prominent businessmen and professionals had the same principles and code of ethics that our club subscribes to today. They knew what Lionism was and they went on to serve their community. "The biggest asset of any nation being its people, one of the cardinal points of Lionism is the cultivation of a spirit of genuine brotherhood among men." Today the Ontario-Host Lions Club has continued with the efforts of these men from the past and provides service activities in the areas of sight conservation, youth activities and community betterment projects. On September 10th our club working alongside our branch club and several members from other clubs to "join hands in service" at the CLFIS Vision Screening in Ontario. The smiles and thanks were everywhere and it seemed to give especially the children a new view of the world. Each month our club offers a "Student of the Month" to each of our five schools in the Ontario area. This program was started by Ed Bordenkircher and it enables a teacher to choose a student based on academics, leadership, spirit or any other criteria deemed appropriate. On September 20th our club gave five worthy students, accompanied by their parents and teachers, a nice lunch, a small financial reward and a framed certificate for the "Ed Bordenkircher Student of the Month" project. The month ended with the Foothill Region Meeting held at the Lion Center in Rancho Cucamonga. Lion Joan Parks and IPDG Ken Myers demonstrated how to use the spot cameras which will become a vital asset in our future vision screenings. It was an enjoyable event and a good start to the Foothill clubs joining hands in support of their communities.











The **Pomona Host Lions** started off September by walking with fellow Lions and their families in the Pomona Day Parade at the Los Angeles County Fair. The crowds yelled their approval as the marchers, wearing club shirts and waving stuffed Lions, yelled, "We are the Lions." An ongoing club project is the Little Free Libraries. Members have been busy collecting, transporting and organizing books, and the stewards have been faithfully restocking the Little Free Libraries. The club warmly thanks all the Lions in the district for your contributions of books! You have really helped. Our club members have also helped at two California Lions Friends in Sight screenings, filled a table at the Governor's fundraiser and are planning our Corky's Night out for Literacy and our annual Bowl-athon. This month we collected and shipped 400 pairs of used eyeglasses and a club member, Dr. Ana Lorenz, went on a medical/dental mission to El Salvador.

Clark Selters, 26, received some good-natured ribbing when he became a Lion in May 2016. "Yeah, they said, 'Here's another Selters.' I got some jabs," he says. Selters is a fourth-generation Lion. His father, John Selters III, 63, joined the Pomona Host Lions in California in 1987. He was preceded by his father, the late John, a member from 1952 to 2009, and Clark's greatgrandfather, John, a Pomona Lion from at least 1932-1940. Clark has a lot to live up to. "My father and grandfather set records with perfect attendance," he says. His great-grandfather helped the club start the Los Angeles County Fair. Lions were part of Clark's youth. He ate at the club's barbecues, won first-place in the club's Bowl-a-thon and attended an international convention at age 3. "I remember my grandfather always wearing his Lions hat. He really enjoyed being a Lion," says Clark. "But there was no pressure [to join]." Lions are not the only thing four generations of Selters have in common. All are (or were) lawyers in the family practice. "We're not too original, I guess," says Selters. "We're not getting any smarter."






SADDLEBACK ZONE C CHAIR JOHN ULRICH






