A Message from District Governor Bob Susaeta



I can't believe that September is already here! The time is going by so fast. We have had a good couple of months in our District and I am sure that things will get better each month as we journey through the year. Our District now stands at 1,271 members which is a net gain of 40 since the 1st of July. Seal Beach added 30 members and we have inducted several members at each and every one of our club visitations. Clubs, please get these new members recorded with LCI! Let's make this number official!

Several things have been scheduled for the year. We are back on track with our Ensenada visit which is March 4, 2017. We have a Guiding Lion Certification Class scheduled at Garden Grove Club House on October 22nd. It is important that we all get re-certified every three years. As of now we have only four Certified Guiding Lions in the District. Hope to see you all there.

Some other exciting news is that we will be chartering our first Centennial Lions Club on September 24th. This will be the Orange County Hana Lions Club. They will charter with at least thirty new members. On September 1st Huntington Beach Host Lions inducted fifteen new members into their new branch club, The Champions Lions Club of Orange County. It is our goal to have both the Champions and the Laguna Beach Branch Clubs chartered as Lions Clubs within the next few months.

In keeping with International President Bob Corlew's theme of "NEW MOUNTAINS TO CLIMB," we as a District have started the climb by getting on board with my theme of "JOINING HANDS IN SERVICE." Let me give you a few examples as to how this is working. The Tustin Host Lions Club received a request from the Tustin Boys and Girls Club for help distributing water for an event they were having. President Diane Quinlan put out the call for help and got responses from Ontario, Upland, Harbor Mesa and Orange Lions. All of these clubs together provided a service that just one club alone could not provide. The Tustin Boys and Girls Club was so happy with the help the Lions provided that they have invited us back and are going to put us on their fliers for eye glass collections. Chino Valley Lions took their Ice Cream Truck to the La Habra Corn Festival and I understand did quite well with sales. Per Seal Beach Lion Scott Newton, their club continues to be the "go-to group" when other organizations or the city needs support or a partner. They helped their city celebrate their Lifeguards' 51st Anniversary by cooking a free breakfast for 200 current and former lifeguards, sponsored and supported Seal Beach's Shakespeare in the Park, became the new "co-host" of their town's Rotary Club's Fishing Derby (cooking free breakfast for the 120 "fisher-kids"), supported their local police department by handing out popcorn at the annual National Night Out event, partnered with the Seal Beach Yacht Club for Sailing for the Blind and co-hosted the city's End of Summer Bash by agreeing to work the games and snack booths as well as cook a free meal for up to 240 attendees. Last week they joined California Lions Friends in Sight along with Ontario Host, Upland Host, Cucamonga Host and Ontario Upland to provide vision screenings and free eyeglasses to several hundred members of the Foothill Region community. And that's just this summer!

It is clear that when we work together not only do we serve our communities but also each other. And isn't this what Lionism is really all about? Let's keep up the great work and show the state that District 4-L4 is tops in working together to make a difference!

TWO MORE ADVENTURES IN YEP!

My Summer in Japan by Diego Zertuche, age 16

Japan was so cool! When I got off of the plane, I was met by Chiaki-San and some of his students. Although, I was really tired, I was so shocked about how green everything was. We drove to the college and there I met all of the students that would be spending time with me (and really helping me) for the next 10 days. Over the course of those days, I made many friends! During the daytime I helped with the English classes and then in the evenings, I would play sports with all of the college kids. At night we would have dinner and always do different activities. One night, Chiaki-san took me to the Hyatt Regency in Tokyo for the Lions Club Meeting. It was the fanciest hotel I had ever been to! They asked me to speak for a minute and I was really nervous but actually it went fine. Although I hadn't planned a joke, they all laughed when I said I had a pet snake. I was sort of confused as to why that was funny, but I guess that the Japanese can't imagine having a pet snake. My second homestay family consisted of an adult couple, Chosei and his wife (who asked me to call her Mama). They went out of their way to make sure that I had such a special experience. After I told Chosei that I liked fishing, he took me on a fishing boat. I learned that reels in Japan are completely electric and require no cranking, which is something you don't see in the United States (at least I haven't). I caught like 20 tuna fish! Afterwards, we walked up to the captain's house and his wife prepared fresh sashimi from our catch along with grilled and fried fish. It was so amazingly delicious. We ended the night at the traditional Japanese bathhouse. I told my mom over the phone that no tourist could ever have had such an experience. I felt so lucky to actually be with a real Japanese family. There was a third family who took me for a weekend. They showed me the Tokyo tower, Animate, and I played chess with their teenage kids. They were also so nice and welcoming. I ended my Japan stay at the national Olympic youth center with other Lion's Club kids from around the world. Here I met my best friends on the trip. My friends from Italy and Germany, Lobo and Felix, spent every day with me playing cards, visiting amusement parks and learning about each other's lives. I will never forget this experience. I would like to thank the Lions Club for allowing me to go on such a great trip and helping me experience the culture of Japan. Thank you so much!

My Adventures in the Faroe Islands by Garrett Elms

I've been home from the Faroe Islands for about one month, but I think about the trip every day. It was my first real experience away from home, a helpful precedent to my departure for college. I remember lying in my bed my first night, unable to sleep from the jet lag and the realization of everything suddenly fell on top of me. I'll admit I was terrified. I missed my home in California and felt very alone in a country most Americans have never even heard of. Not to mention, the time change had all my friends back home active on social media right as I was trying to fall asleep, so as I lay feeling alone and awake, I had full access to whatever activity I had 'missed out on'. Over time, however, the warmth of the Faroese culture and the magnificent landscapes dispelled all feelings of homesickness. I have never been anywhere like the Faroes. It's like an oddly beautiful mixture of rural and urban living that you'll never find anywhere else. The people are innovative and eager to learn new things about different beliefs and customs. This can be seen in the mass growth of upcoming artists and musicians I had the chance to meet and speak with. At the same time the people love their history and traditions, keeping self-sustained farming methods intact and continuing to fish and hunt with communal interest and quality-motivated reasoning. The amount of respect the Faroese people have for the environment and their land is incredible. The Faroes are like a little utopia in the middle of the Atlantic Ocean. Everyone is friendly, you can find just about anything you need on the islands and there's a strong community of open-minded and accepting people who are ardently looking for ways to make their world even greater than it already is. I'm so happy I chose the Faroes as my travel destination and I couldn't be more grateful for the hard work the Lion's Club put in for getting me there. Perhaps the greatest part of my trip, however, was having the opportunity to meet students from all over the world. It was fascinating to meet young people who, beneath our ethnic backgrounds, were really quite similar. It was a realization we all made around a week and a half into our trip. Minus the accents and food preferences, there wasn't that much about us that really separated us. We were all just human beings enjoying each other's company. It's funny how it takes a trip like this to remember something that simple. I had an amazing time with these new friends and I'm happy to say we all have kept in touch and contact each other frequently. It was one girl from Denmark's birthday yesterday and we all sent her a message letting her know we were thinking about her. It's cool being a part of something like that. My experience in the Faroe Islands was an adventure I'll never forget. While most people who travel to such locations might recall hikes or whatever their itinerary had scheduled, which, don't get me wrong, is a great way to enjoy the Islands, thanks to the Lion's Club I have something better than a story I can tell at a party to impress my fellow Americans. I have the warm memory of walking along the Torshavn harbor with friends, each representing a rich nationality and culture, forming bonds I know will last for years.




