#### CABINET TREASURER REPORT

Understanding Dues Structure? When you add a new member to your Lions club does your secretary code them correctly? This new member can be a Regular Member, Family Member, Student Member or Leo to Lion. As their Lions years' progress do you make adjustments to their status? Do you make sure they are still coded correctly? Maybe they no longer qualify as Student Member up to age 30, Leo to Lion, maybe now they have become a family member or a life time member. All of these changes can affect their dues.

A new member pays \$35 to LCI entrance fee as a regular or family. For students and Leos to Lions the fee is waived. Then dues are: LCI \$43 a year, MD4 \$18 a year and 4-L4 is \$15.50 a year. Your own club dues are added on to that amount and is set by each individual club. If a new member is a Family Member or Student their dues to LCI is \$21.50 which is half. To be considered a family member two Lions MUST be in same Lions Club with the same mailing address. A student is not charged dues from MD4. This must be certified that he/she is a student up to the age of 30 must be verified yearly. **4-L4 charges all Lions members no matter their membership status. These dues allow the District to operate.** 

Please call or email me if you have questions about dues structure. You can also go directly to LCI or MD4 if you're confused about what your club is being charged.

#### **GLOBAL LEADERSHIP TEAM (GLT) UPDATE**



Are you a "Show Pony" or a "Work Horse?" Both of these types of people have pros and cons and most organizations need a mixture in both leadership and followers of these types. There are the interesting variants of the "Work Pony" and "Show Horse" as well. These are generally less common, but you recognize them when you see them. What spells trouble is when a club becomes filled with only one type!

Show Ponies are known for their dazzling sense of panache, fashion and latest grasp of technology. They are often on the cutting edge and are trendsetters. In groups they often draw attention to themselves while highlighting their friends. Imagine that friend of yours that is always "on stage." Frequently concerned about appearances, the Show Pony likes to be part of a group that lavishes attention on them. They in turn become evangelists for those things which interest them. What is great about the Show Pony is the amount of energy they bring to any given venture. Their enthusiasm is infectious and before you know it, large groups of people a drawn to them like moths to a flame. Show Ponies are actually pretty easily bored, and if it isn't about them, they generally have the attention span of a fruit fly. They flit from concept to concept, group to group and fad to flash.

Work Horses on the other hand are plodding, deliberate, consistent and are highly stable. They tend to show up and get it done. They may not be innovative or insightful, but just keep working. They know they aren't the Show Pony and sometimes that may bother them. They often don't understand why more people don't see their value, after all, they do most of the work, right? Work Horses don't need an entourage and frequently disparage those they perceive as Show Ponies in private (often with other Work Horses), but secretly want the accolades that seem to come to the Show Pony. On the plus side, Work Horses rarely complain about tasks given to them and understand their own limitations far more quickly than others. They tend to be more mature in their decision-making and will admit to being wrong more easily than some.

There are two sub-breeds which are quite rare.

The Work Pony is the individual who often has their reach exceed their grasp, much to their surprise. Often young and inexperienced (literally or mentally), they simply don't understand their own limitations and preconceptions. Also, they may be living in "past glories" of the significant work they have done in the past. Many of us have already gone through this as a phase, but unfortunately for some of us, we never move beyond it.

Finally is the Show Horse. This type not only has the strength to get it done, they get it done in style. They lead by example, often perform the tasks that others think are "beneath them" and still manage to make it seem "cool." They have the incredible dynamic power of the Show Pony paired with the maturity and "get it done" consistent ethic of the Work Horse. Many powerful leaders I know fall into this category. They manage to just always seem to get it done and get it done in style. Also, if you notice, they are everywhere and seemingly touch nearly everything.

Take a look at your club, zone, region and district. Do you know where you fall and those close to you? What is your opinion of the leadership you experience with various people when we all get together? Strive to be the best you can be and others invariably follow suit! There are no "wrong" types, just different!

(No computer art is allowed) The works vary greatly and reflect the young artists' life experiences and culture.

Please order your kits by October 1, 2018. You can order the kit for \$11.95 through LCI by either calling Club Supplies at 1-630-571-5466 or ordering the kit on line. One kit per group or school is needed.

Club entries must be brought to the 2<sup>nd</sup> District meeting on October 20<sup>th</sup> for judging. Please make sure that you follow the directions for labeling each poster entry. The winner will be sent on for the next level (the MD4 contest) by the District Governor. Deadline for the District Governor to submit one winning entry is December 1, 2018. The Multiple District winner must be submitted to the Public Relations Department of Lions Club International by December 15, 2018. The winner will be notified on or before February 2, 2019. The winning poster will receive a cash award of \$5,000 and a trip to a special award ceremony. There will also be awarded 23 merit winners. They will receive a cash award of \$500 and a certificate of achievement.



The **Ontario Host Lions Club** is starting this years' service to their community with a new president, Michael Shaw, and their newly elected officers. President Michael Shaw will be this year's Foothill Region Zone B chair and is looking forward to bringing their club's news, activities and service to The Forum. The **Ontario Host Lions** have completed all four of the "Centennial Challenges" with their work in: "Protecting our Environment" by planting a tree for the Lincoln school students in Ontario, "Relieving Hunger" by feeding 200 families with their food basket program each holiday, "Sharing the Vision" by volunteering at several vision screenings in the Foothill area and "Engaging our Youth" by hosting a special needs gift luncheon for the students at Lincoln school. As well as participating in both the Zone B Wellness Health Fair and the Region Diabetes Awareness



Fair the Lemon Festival in Upland, screening one hundred and eighty-four individuals. The club will be dark during the month of August but is looking forward to this coming year to continue with each of the above programs and looking forward to new projects to serve their community. Ontario-Hosts Lions is a small club with a big heart!

The <u>Pomona Host Lions Club's</u> activities for the month of June were a combination of service projects and activities to close one Lions year and begin another. Our club's Feeding the Homeless program continued with feeding 140 homeless men and women at the city's shelter, and members heard a presentation on the new city homeless shelter, which is about to be built. Little Free Library stewards busily kept our club's six LFL's and three mini-libraries well-stocked, often with trips to refill them once a week, sometimes even more. Community and club planning sessions are already underway for the annual Kids Summer Campout, where our members run the Giant Bubble Booth.

The Pomona Host Lions' used eyeglasses recycling program, with its collection boxes around the city, netted 375 glasses, and our Pomona Lions Vision and Hearing Center continued to provide exams and glasses to students in the Pomona Unified School District. Our members continued to actively participate in the Red Cross's "Prepare Pomona," both preparing for potential large disasters like earthquakes and organizing with other local service clubs to install smoke detectors in the homes of residents who can't afford them. Also, the grant committee continued to plan for and write other grants to augment our successful grant to purchase vision cameras, which we can use for testing pre-school and kindergarteners.







As the year approaches its end, <u>Pomona Host Lions</u> members have been busy attending the New Officer Training, a joint board meeting of new and old officers, and spending many hours planning a beautiful installation. Our new President Anne Henderson was installed with her theme of "Serve with Passion and Pride." PDG Gil Smith conducted the installation. Outgoing President Carmen Morris had a meaningful Awards Ceremony. Receiving plaques were Jo Fulton, Lion of the Year; Denny Mosier, Melvin Jones Fellow; Ben Selters, Kay K. Fukushima Fellow; Steve King and Clark Selters, Distinguished Service Awards. New member Andie Morris was also inducted into the club.

#### City Manager Ken Domer Gives Presentation on Fullerton Issues

by Jane Rands

One year after being selected as Fullerton's City Manager, Ken Domer spoke at back-to-back events on June 20 ye and 21. For the second in their series of monthly community meetings, the Fullerton Lions Club asked Mr. Domer to discuss Fullerton's infrastructure, finances, challenges, and the status of development. The following morning Mr. Domer sat on a panel of city managers invited to speak to the Korean American \_\_\_\_\_\_ Chamber of Commerce of OC

(KACCOC).

(KACCOC). At the Lions Club meeting, Mr. Domer started with some personal background. He is an Orange County native who resides in the City of Orange. When graduating high school, he already knew he wanted to be a city manager. After working in the courty and city courts. state, county, and city govern-ments and agencies, he said, "Fullerton is one of the places I wanted to land." He plans to stay with Fullerton until he retires in short 1/ merca

about 16 years. Budget: Mr. Domer explained that the 2018-19 fiscal year City Budget is \$194 million of which \$93 million is designated to the General Fund for city services such as the library and parks and recre-ation. He pointed out that 49% of the General Fund goes to police and 21% to

fire. Pensions: He identified the "pension crises" as a challenge. He faulted former Governor Gray Davis for the crisis because Davis signed legislation in 1999 that changed the California Public Employees Retirement System rules to all-our unblic softer employees to retire at allow public safety employees to retire at 50 and receive 90% of their last year of 50 and receive 50% of their has year of salary and non-safety employees to receive 60% of their salary at the age of 55. City Councils, including Fullerton's, then voted in the same benefits for their nployees. Mr. Domer stated that cities will "start

to fail" in the next 2 to 3 years because of the cost of pensions. But he is "cautiously optimistic" about Fullerton. Based on different budget scenarios (available on the city's website) Fullerton should be able to ntain a 10% reserve over the next 5 years

Fullerton currently spends \$68 million on salary and benefits for 615 fulltime employees. That's 105 fewer than in 2009. Line level staff and managers are tracking

their budgets. Mr. Domer thinks it is good that Fullerton has "transparency in negotia-

tions" that require reporting to the public. He credited police for "stepping up" in the last round of negotiations when they agreed to spread a 4.5% increase over 4 He anticipates Fullerton will be making

He anticipates Fullerton will be making single-year employment agreements rather than four-year agreements in the future. If the anticipated economic down-turn results in a loss of property or sales tax revenue the city will then have an

Mr. Domer has agreed to pay 13% of his \$225,000 annual salary into his pension while the city pays 16.5%. He stated that in the future he will take on more of his pension costs and not take salary increases to "lead by exam-ple." Though he said, that's "not going to rolve the penhem."

solve the problem." Tax on Sales: Long-term, he said, "I am nervous" about Fullerton's future finances because of uncertainties. He encouraged the audience to "shop locally" because the city receives 1% of 8.25% tax on sales in Fullerton and he will be working on "putting in a fiscally sustainable struc-

Street Repair: Mr. Domer said the streets are the city's largest asset valued at \$450 million. He explained that the 2018-19 budget has \$7 million in street repairs with \$35 million from the historic gas tax, \$2.2 million from the Measure M2 quarter-cent county sales tax, and another \$2.5 million from the recentlyenacted SB1 gas tax. If that gas tax is repealed by voters in November, he said there will be a "hole" in the funding

Possible future street repair funds could come from assessment districts, where come from assessment districts, where bonds are sold to directly benefit the streets within the district. The city could also bond against future gas tax revenue. But Mr. Domer thinks this is a "bad idea" because bonds would double the cost. Another option might be a local half-cent sales tax to go towards roads.

Development: Mr. Domer said the new Development Director Ted White is



reviewing processes to make improve-ments that will encourage new business. They are also focusing on downtown issues, such as where to park employees to make room for customer parking and considering paid parking for late night uses. They are looking at finding ways to better regulate alcohol and entertainment at restaurants. There are new opportunities for busi-

There are new opportunities for bu ness at two industrial locations. The ness at two industrial locations. The Beckman site is being rebuilt around the historically protected Beckman Administration Building. And though Kimberly Clark is leaving in 3 years, he envisions the 66 acres as a place for

envisions the 66 acres as a place for research and development, some retail, and a business class hotel. **Coyote Hills**: There is "no news yet," according to Domer, about what will become of the \$15 million anticipated from the state for purchasing portions of West Coyote Hills since the author of SB714, Senator Josh Newman, was recalled. He said the Friends of Coyote Hills (FCH) court appeal will be heard recalled. He said the Friends of Coyote Hills (FCH) court appeal will be heard soon and FCH will have another opportu-nity to appeal to the state supreme court if this appeal fails. He said he hopes the state will help with funding. Homelessness: When asked about Judge Carter's efforts to encourage cities to provide housing for people living on the street, Mr. Domer said Fulletton was 'part of the good group that the judge

"part of the good group that the judge likes," because Fullerton is working to provide housing. He also cited unaffor able housing as a cause for overcrowded housing that creates street parking prob-

Mr. Domer responded that after the KACCOC event he would be heading to a North Orange County meeting on homelessness followed by a meeting about animal control with neighboring cities.




