Hello Lions. The other day, a friend reminded me of the "Ham Story." There are various versions of this story. Essentially it goes like this. Paulette was preparing to cook a ham for the holidays with her daughter Susie. Susie watched her mom cut off the ends of the ham and asked why. Paulette said "I don't really know why. Grandma always did this." Later in the day, Paulette called her mother and asked why she cut the ends off the ham only to be told, "I don't know why, my mother always did that." A few days later Paulette saw her grandmother and asked her why she cut the ends off the ham. Her grandmother replied, "I did it because the roasting pan was too small and I needed it to fit."

Traditions are customs or beliefs passed on from generation to generation. Traditions provide comfort, even when we have forgotten the reason for establishing the tradition in the first place. In the Ham Story, the tradition evolved from a practical necessity that is no longer necessary. We tend to do this from time to time; continue with traditions even when we do not understand why we are doing so. In Paulette's case, it was a family tradition passed down by the women in her family. Are we doing the same thing in our clubs and at the District?

This year District leadership has turned the pyramid upside down. Clubs and members are at the top and District leadership is at the bottom. We now have an online directory, we are taking the website to the next level, we are communicating directly to Lions in the District, we kick-started our efforts to identify emerging Lion leaders, and we are taking to heart, "Joining Hands in Service." GLOBAL LEADERSHIP TEAM: Leading Women: 30 Years of Lionism



This Lion's year, 2018-19, represents several significant milestones: it is the 30th year anniversary of women inducted as Lions and Gudrun Yngvadottir, from Gardabaer, Iceland, is the first female Lion to be elected LCI President. She is a biomedical scientist and has worked in research, education, and management. Since 1990 she has worked at the University of Iceland as Vice Director at the Institute of Continuing Education. A member of the Gardabaejar Eik Lions Club since 1992, President Gudren has held many offices within the association, including district governor and council chairperson.

I am confident that in your club, there is at least one influential, powerful female leader and volunteer. In the ancient world, Plato said, "If women are expected to do the same work as men, we must teach them the same things." Our clubs are the fertile ground to develop leaders, and we should not just be blind to gender, we should actively encourage strong female leaders. Why? There are many reasons, and President Gudren tells us as part of her theme and direction, "to reach beyond our limits, we must reach within our clubs, communities, and selves."

Look at our immediate Past District Governor Judy Barr who was a bright, visionary leader. PDG Ellen Liebherr, who was the first female district governor of 4-L4 in 1998-99, broke through the gender ceiling at let's face it, pretty early in the Lion's world of California.

The Leadership team charges all of you who read this to reach out, connect with and encourage our women leaders - emergent and mentoring. Personally, I have been deeply affected by many female mentors, Lions, and friends. I am sure you have too. What often we don't understand in Lionism is we just have to ask. Asking people to step up, or ask what their interests might be, could ignite a powerful leader.

Finally, I will give my fellow Lions a book recommendation: "Lean In: Women, Work, and the Will to Lead" by Sheryl Sandberg, her 2013 New York Times bestseller, about women in the workplace. She outlines through her career and experiences at Facebook, now as COO of the company, her and her fellow female leaders' journey and key steps to success. They are great insights for any leader, regardless of gender. Diversity in Lionism leads to greater sustainability, community engagement and ultimately, service. So just go out and ask!

(No computer art is allowed) The works vary greatly and reflect the young artists' life experiences and culture. Club entries must be brought to the 2nd District Meeting on October 20, 2018 for judging. Please make sure that you follow the directions for labeling each poster entry. The winner will be sent on by the District Governor to the next level, the MD4 contest. The Multiple District winner must be submitted to the Public Relations Department of Lions Club International by December 15, 2018. The winner will be notified on or before February 2, 2019. The winning poster will receive a cash award of \$5,000 and a trip to a special award ceremony. There will also be awarded 23 merit winners. THE POWER OF PERSISTENCE by Lion Michael Shaw

"It was the best of times, it was the worst of times, it was the age of wisdom, it was the age of foolishness, it was the epoch of belief, it was the epoch of incredulity, it was the season of Light, it was the season of Darkness, it was the spring of hope, it was the winter of despair." Charles Dickens

"It was the epoch of belief:" It all started on a warm day in 2015. Guiding Lion Training was offered and I was bound and determined to become one. Little did I know this would start me on a quest that would not be accomplished until 2018. A group of us were headed to the Garden Grove Clubhouse when I saw it standing near the parking lot, an old mail box that was yellow and inviting. It was out there asking people to recycle their eyeglasess to help others and the allure of it was captivating. I just knew that my club could use one just this way, to sit out there and collect.

"The spring of hope:" I talked to a few Garden Grove club members but they did not know how the box came about. I later found out that PDG Ken Myers had gotten one for the Upland club from the Upland Police Department. So I took a trip to the Upland Police with the name of Ken's contact, but to no avail. On my way home from Upland, I decided to stop by my local post office and inquire about the old mail boxes. I was told to contact the Post Master General so I did. I wrote him a letter that was heartfelt including Helen Keller's message to be the "knights of the blind" and pictures of how the box would be used. He wrote back stating that the USPS no longer allows individuals to have their mail boxes for fear of embarrassment. This turned out to be, "the winter of despair"

"The age of foolishness" Time passed and that next summer, after no luck in acquiring my own mail box, I decided to piggy back with the one the Upland Lions had behind the Upland Library. It was faded and seemed to be in disrepair so I went to one of their business meetings. With PDG Bob Susaeta's, "joining hands in service" in mind and a professional powder coater in my pocket, I knew our clubs could work on the box together. I showed them pictures of the Garden Grove box and gave a moving talk, but all I did was motivate them to do something about theirs.

<u>"The age of wisdom:"</u> Undiscouraged I decided to buy one on eBay or Craig's List - nothing. I ran an ad – wanted-old mail boxes – still nothing. The definition of crazy is doing the same thing over and over and expecting a different result so I went a different route. I contacted Lion Dave Flatten, our powder coater, and asked him if he had worked on any other type of receptacle that our club could use for recycling our eye glasses. He told me he was working with a client who had book receptacle bins that would probably work and he would ask him about getting us one.

"The season of light:" On the evening of our club's installation, Dave told me his client had come through and had dropped off two bins we could use for our glasses. The bins were perfect. I had decals made and saw that just one of the bins needed to be powder coated and the end results were amazing. After almost three years, on August 21st during the District Governor's visit, I was able to present the finished bins to our club.

This is a great way to involve your Leos. Just drive them to event, open your trunk and let them do the rest!



- April-RMH Walk for Kids. Please ask your club to allocate some monies for this event as there are no district monies available.





CALIFORNIA LIONS FOUNDATION

Test Your Knowledge on What CLF is All About?

What is the California Lions Foundation (CLF)?

• It is a California non-profit, tax exempt, IRC 501(c)(3) corporation.

Why was it formed?

- Its sole purpose is to provide matching financial grants to California Lions clubs and districts.
- To better meet the needs of California Lions clubs and districts as they provide even greater service to their local communities.
- To provide a means by which donors (individual Lions, Lions clubs, Lions districts and corporations) can be assured their entire donation will stay in California.
- There are at least six other state foundations in the US: Colorado, Michigan, New York, Pennsylvania, Texas and Wisconsin.

Compare LCIF and CLF:

- Both are 501(c)(3) charitable foundations.
- Both accept donations by cash or publically traded securities.
- Both make matching grants to Lions clubs and districts for charitable activities.
- LCIF starts at \$10,000 grants v. CLF is for grants ranging from \$500 \$10,000.
- CLF has an expedited approval process for grants of \$500 \$2,500.
- CLF does not make grants that are available from other sources (e.g. LCIF) so we are not duplicating services.
- LCIF has a broad international focus v. CLF which is just for California. On average approximately 10% 15% of California contributions to LCIF come back to California vs. CLF which will put 100% donations received back into California.
- CLF accepts cars, boats, RVs and motor homes (as well as real estate with prior CLF board approval).

Funding Sources:

- Individual Lions, Lions clubs and districts, and corporate sponsors.
- Kay K. Fukushima Fellow \$1,000. Reginald Harris Fellow \$2,500. Who were Kay K. Fukushima and Reginald Harris?
- Founding Member individual Lions, clubs and districts. To date there are over 85 individual Lions who are Kay K. Fukushima Fellows or Reginald Harris Fellows. There also are at least nine clubs and districts.
- Other Opportunities for Recognition: Contributing Member; Life Member; Progressive Fukushima and Harris Fellowships; Partnership (Corporate) Donations.
- Objective is to raise \$250,000 corpus before starting the matching grant process.
- Funds raised to date are approximately \$185,000.
- We also have our first corporate sponsor for \$5,000.
- CLF accepts designated donations with prior CLF board approval. Most notably is the recent designated donation program for wildfire relief.

Recognition:

- Club banner patch.
- Plagues for Life member, Fukushima Fellow and Harris Fellow.
- Pins for \$100, \$500, \$1,000 and \$2,500 donations.
